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PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: As always, we're going to start with the Pledge of Allegiance, and I'll ask all to rise and join Legislator Strauss as he leads us.

(Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance is said by all.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Thank you. As always, we start with our Full Legislature with our monthly Top Cop's presentation. First we're going to have the PBA.

OFFICER SHANAHAN: On January 27, 2024, BSO police officers were on burglary patrol in the Sixth Precinct when a call was dispatched that possibly two males had broken into a house and a burglary in progress with shots fired in Greenvale. One male broke into the house through a window armed with a handgun. The subject held the homeowners at gunpoint and demanded money. The son of the homeowner saw this, ran upstairs, grabbed his shotgun. When the son came out of his bedroom, he saw that one of

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the subjects had followed him. He was holding his mother at gunpoint, saying, I'll shoot her, I'll shoot her. The son then shot the subject, who was then able to flee through a window. BSO officers quickly entered the house looking for the second burglar. They cleared the house and rendered aid to the victims. Officers then started canvassing for the burglar that was shot. They were able to locate and follow his blood trail. They located the subject underneath a neighbor's deck. They ordered the subject to come out, but he refused. Knowing that he may still be carrying the gun, they secured the perimeter and K-9 Officer Kerley, along with his dog Shammy, responded. K-9 Shammy went underneath the deck and was able to take the burglar into custody safely. In the end, there was only the one subject. And the officers recovered a loaded Ruger 22 caliber handgun, duct tape and zip ties. Because of the officers' quick response and bravery,

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they were able to take this dangerous felon off the street.

The PBA is proud to honor police officers Jason Collins, Daniel Fels, Frank Donahue, Gavin Davila, Andrew Nill, Stephen Kovacs, and Rory Kerley as Top Legislative Cops for May of 2020 for.

(Whereupon, applause.)

DEPUTY COMMISSIONER SMITH: Deputy Commissioner Kevin Smith filling in for Commissioner Pat Ryder.

First, let me thank you all for being so supportive of our Department recognizing our efforts and in this forum, it means a great deal to all of us.

Well, you heard what transpired. Burglary in progress with shots fired; not a light call. This has you thinking about tactics before you even get there. Your mind is on recall, bringing to the forefront your training and your experience. And even after you arrive, circumstances can get a little bit more

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complicated. A member of the household has a weapon. Could that be a problem? You bet it could; absolutely. This just adds to whatever chaos we run into. Unfortunately for the criminals here in Nassau County, we're damn good at managing chaos.

We look for a second subject, we render aid to the victims, and we begin to hunt for the home invader that may have been hit by that shot that we got a call to. Canvassing, looking for evidence, trying to determine if someone has recently run from the area are all things that we do. Bloodstains lead us to a subject with a weapon. He has hidden and barricaded himself under a deck. Officers use extreme caution -- remember, we believe that he has a weapon -- surround the area while our expert at retrieving things gets ready to do his part.

K-9 Officer Kerley prepares K-9 Shammy. I'm going to call him Officer

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2 Shammy today; he deserves it. I'll just
3 say this. You don't try to do a home
4 invasion in Nassau County and mess with
5 one of our dogs. Officer Shammy dives
6 under the deck and we have a subject in
7 custody. Recovered a loaded 22 caliber
8 handgun, duct tape, as was said before,
9 zip ties; not what the good citizens of
10 Nassau County usually have in their
11 possession.

12 Very proud to honor these officers
13 today. Police Officer Jason Collins,
14 Daniel Fels, Frank Donahue, Gavin Davila,
15 Andrew Nill, Steven Kovacs, Rory Kerley
16 and of course, Shammy, obviously one of
17 our canine superstars, I want to thank
18 you again. I want to shake all my
19 officer's hands right now, if you will.

20 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay.
21 Would one of the officers care to speak?

22 (Whereupon, Shammy "speaks"
23 barks.)

24 (Whereupon, applause.)

25 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Anyone

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else?

(Whereupon, no response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Legislator
Goetz.

LEGISLATOR GOETZ: Hello. Thank you
for being here.

We sit up here today with this deep
sense of gratitude and immense pride as
we recognize the exemplary bravery and
dedication of our Nassau County police
officers.

As we just heard during this routine
patrol, these officers were faced with an
unexpected and dangerous situation that
tested their courage and their resolve
when the call came over that there was a
burglary in progress with shots fired.
Two individuals, armed and dangerous,
broke into this family's home and held
the owners at gunpoint. And without
hesitation, these brave officers
confronted the danger head on. Officer
Nill and Kovacs displayed remarkable
tenacity and was able to follow the blood

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trail of the suspect, and that determination led to the locating of that suspect. And then Officer Kerley, with his very adorable and faithful partner, Shammy, helped end the whole ordeal with the final apprehension. The swift and coordinated efforts of these officers, and professionalism and courage involved to apprehend the suspect, ensure the safety of our community that they swore to protect.

The recovery of the loaded firearm, the duct tape, the zip ties really underscore the gravity of the situation and what you all faced that day in the face of adversity. These officers remained resolute, demonstrating the true essence of law enforcement, protecting and serving with valor regardless of level of danger presented.

So today it is with immense pride and gratitude that this Body recognizes Officers Jason Collins, Daniel Fells, Frank Donahue, Gavin Davila, Andrew Nil,

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Steven Kovacs, Rory Kerley and Shammy as
Legislative Top Cops for May of 2024.

Today, we honor not just you for
this act of heroism in January, but also
for the daily sacrifices you make every
single day to keep our county safe. May
we always stand by your side and always
support you and honor you. Thank you for
your service.

Thank you.

LEGISLATOR DAVIS: Gentlemen, I'm
Scott Davis. I just wanted to commend
all of you for tremendous work. You were
put in a very volatile situation which
could have very easily gone bad very
quickly, and I think we all recognize
that. But I think one of the takeaways
that we should all have from this is the
value of training, the value of
experience, the value of coordination
among all of you and what you all did
without a single person being hurt,
demonstrates the premium that is placed
on your training, your coordination. And

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so from all of us here on the horseshoe,
I commend you. Thank you.

(Whereupon, applause.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Would you
like to come up for a quick photo?

(Whereupon, citations and
photos taken.)

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PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: We now have some points of personal privilege. First is Legislator Mullaney.

LEGISLATOR MULLANEY: Perfect. Thank you, Presiding Officer.

Ladies and gentlemen, as a point of personal privilege today, I'd like to recognize an incredible young woman who has not only excelled academically, but has also demonstrated an unwavering commitment to giving back to her community. It's my great honor to welcome and introduce Miss Catherine Lynch of Long Beach.

Catherine's a daughter of James and Robin Lynch, and hails from a family where the spirit of giving and community service is deeply ingrained. I personally know both her parents and grandparents, and it's no wonder she turned out to be such a stellar young woman.

Catherine is a proud graduate of Sacred Heart Academy, the Class of 2024, and was recently recognized as a

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Regeneron Scholar. She is only the second student from Sacred Heart Academy to be honored by the Regeneron Science Talent Search. Her research project, entitled "Mindset Over Matter; Can Self-Reported Implicit Theories of Intelligence Regulate the Desire For Academic Rigor, Academic Achievement and Motivation?", is a brilliant exploration of power, of mindset and education. It's also almost impossible to say.

Through her research, Catherine has investigated the profound impact that self-perception and intrinsic motivation can have on academic success and the desire for academic rigor. Her findings are not just theoretical, but also have profoundly influenced her own mindset as both a student and a researcher. She hopes that this project can advance the conversation regarding support and equity through the American education system.

Catherine's academic journey began back at Long Beach Catholic, from which

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she graduated in 2020, and she's gone on to represent Sacred Heart Academy in Washington, D.C. and Syracuse for her research projects.

Catherine is not only an academic achiever, but also a dynamic member of her school community. She served as an executive board member of the *Cordette*, the Sacred Heart newspaper, and has been actively involved in the "She's the First" and "Red Cross" clubs.

This fall, Catherine will embark on the new journey as she attends the University of Virginia, where she plans to study political philosophy, policy and law.

Beyond her academic and extracurricular achievements, Catherine has been a dedicated worker, but also when she's not in school or working, she loves nothing more than spending time with her friends and shopping -- from what I hear. Supposedly, she's also mildly obsessed with her dog Bo, with

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several thousand pictures on her phone.

Catherine, as you step into this new chapter, let us admire her drive and seek environment and her seeking of environments that challenge and inspire her. I always like to say, if you're the smartest person in the room, you're in the wrong room. Catherine, we wish you the best of luck in finding that room.

Congratulations again on your remarkable achievement. You should be incredibly proud of yourself, and we're excited to see the extraordinary impact you're going to make on us in the future. Thank you.

(Whereupon, applause.)

MS. C. LYNCH: I am beyond honored and grateful to have been named a 2024 Regeneron semifinalists and to receive this proclamation. My project could not have been completed without the support of my classmates and teachers, especially Dr. Sullivan. Dr. Sullivan, my research coordinator, has always encouraged me and

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advocated for my work, and I would not be the student I am today without his unconditional support. I also would not be able to accept this honor was it not for the unwavering support of my amazing parents, Robin and Jamie Lynch. Their encouragement and love have played a pivotal role in shaping both the person and student I am today, and for that, I am forever grateful.

Thank you to the Nassau County Legislature and Legislator Patrick Mullaney for this recognition. It is truly an honor. Thank you.

(Whereupon, applause.)

MS. LYNCH: Thank you, Legislator Mullaney and thank you all here for recognizing our daughter. We are beyond proud of her. We're trying to convince her to stay a little closer to home in the in the fall, but UVA has come calling for her, but you will see her back here in the near future, for sure, doing wonderful things. And thank you again for

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this honor.

LEGISLATOR MULLANEY: Absolutely.

Thank you.

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PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Legislator
Drucker.

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LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you,
Presiding Officer. Just as a perfect
segue to Legislator Mullaney's,
recognition, each year we legislators
have the privilege of formally
recognizing students who have
distinguished themselves in the areas of
scholastics, athletics, community
endeavors.

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One of these accomplishments we had
the privilege of recognizes, as
Legislator Mullaney talked about, the
Regeneron Science. The Regeneron Science
Talent Search Competition is a
pre-college competition that recognizes
high school seniors who have demonstrated
exceptional scientific leadership
potential. It is the oldest and most
prestigious science research competition
in the United States, having been
established in 1942. The competition
recognizes 300 students scholars, and

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their schools each year, and 40 student finalists are invited to Washington, D.C. for final judging. Each finalist earned a \$25,000 award and a trip to Washington, D.C., where they competed for more than \$1.8 million in prizes during the finals. Just as a personal comment, I think we all can agree these kids today are just absolutely brilliant. You know, I consider that myself when I look back in my high school years, I thought I was a fairly good student, got decent grades. When I got a 98 on the biology Regents, I thought I deserved a trip to Washington in the White House.

But each year, as I said today, it gives me great pride to honor and recognize the accomplishments of two Nassau County students from my Legislative District 16. We have Vincent Huang of Syosset High School, Natasha Kulviwat of Jericho High School.

Vincent Huang's work focused on a smart computer program, LauePt4, for

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2 recognizing and simulating Laue patterns
3 and its applications. He wrote a computer
4 program that simulates a crystal's Laue
5 pattern and interior lattice orientation,
6 which uses a technique called white beam
7 topography that consists of X-rays sent
8 through crystal and reflect light and
9 specific patterns depending on what the
10 crystal is made out of quartz, silicone,
11 etc. If I was a judge and I read that
12 title, I would just say you won; there's
13 no competition here. That's an amazing
14 thing.

15 Vincent hopes that his work may
16 increase the speed of crystal processing
17 and help reduce shortages of computer
18 chips -- everybody, pay attention --
19 since existing methods are time consuming
20 and expensive. Thank you.

21 All right, Natasha Kulviwat, had the
22 distinction and honor of being a finalist
23 last year, and she thought she could try
24 it again. I mean, once was not enough.
25 She's so brilliant, she did it again. As

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I said, she previously won a \$50,000 prize during the 2023 Regeneron International Science and Engineering Competition was recognized in this particular current competition for her project addressing -- listen to this -- the "Neurobiology of Suicide Blood Brain Barrier Breakdown As a Novel Suicide Risk Biomarker". This literally, folks, is a groundbreaking discovery that has the potential to save lives. It's absolutely awesome.

Nassau County schools, as we know, are among the best in the state and our nation. And the success of these outstanding scholars in the Regeneron Science Talent Search offers yet another example of the importance of public education. These two individuals, I have no doubt, are on a path to making life changing contributions in a number of ways. Despite the uncertain times we live in, one thing I am certain about is that we have reason to be optimistic with

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the next generation of leaders and
thinkers that we have here today.

Congratulations to the two of you,
your families, teachers, school
administrators. I want to give a quick
shout out to Superintendent Tom Rogers of
the Syosset School District is here
today. So thank you very much.
Congratulations to both of you.

(Whereupon, applause.)

LEGISLATOR WALKER: I too, would
like to honor -- our previous honoree has
left, I believe, with her parents -- but
certainly Vincent from Syosset and our
Jericho winner. Absolutely amazing. I now
represent Jericho also. So I couldn't be
prouder to think that one of my students
in my district has won this award and won
it for a second time. You truly are
amazing. I think of our future looks
very, very bright due to students like
you. I couldn't even imagine coming up
with a with an idea of what to do, and
yet this is what you did your project on

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and you did it so amazing.

I wish you continued success. I'm sure we're going to hear a lot more of you throughout the years. I'm very, very interested, especially in the your work with how it could affect suicide and those who are struggling with suicide. You are certainly someone who has touched lives and hopefully saving lives. So thank you very, very much. And God bless you both and wish you the very best.

MS. KULVIWAT: I want to first thank everyone here for having us today. I'm very honored to share this incredible title with my fellow finalists and friend, Vincent Huang. And also, I would like to thank the Jericho school district for the support that they gave me, as well as especially thank my family for being here today. I would not be here without their unwavering guidance and support, and also to my research mentor for making this happen. Thank you very much once again.

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MR. HUANG: So for me, it's a lot of the same. There's a lot of people I have to thank, Syosset Central School District, Syosset High School. Dr. Rogers, who's right there, very tall, very good juggler.

I'd also like to thank Ms. Hall, who's also here. I can't forget my mother, who's also here, before we get to people who aren't. Also Dr. Hendrickson, Ms. Ayen (phonetic) my research mentor and everyone who's helped me in this whole journey.

Also, obviously, a big thank you to all of you for having us here and giving us a lot of your time. I've seen a lot of you on television, so it's really cool to be here. It's not an opportunity that comes along a lot, and that's not something that I don't recognize (sic). I just have so much appreciation, so much thanks for so many people who've really helped me and Natasha get to this stage and get here. Thank you so much for all

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of your help for everyone who's given us
your help. Thank you again.

(Whereupon, applause.)

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LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you,
Presiding Officer.

I have great, great hope today. Our future is indeed very bright. Today, I was joined here in the Chambers for a mock legislative session by the students of ABGS Middle School out of Hempstead, New York. And if you would stand, legislators.

(Whereupon, "Legislators" in the audience stand.)

(Whereupon, applause.)

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Their questions were plentiful, but most importantly, they were thoroughly thought out and they were articulated very, very clearly and concisely. And I want to thank you for being so engaged through this process.

These students are seventh and eighth graders, and they are studying law, ethics and civics as an elective. And they demonstrated very well why this is important, that we must have these type of programs in our school. And so on

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the behalf of Legislator Scott Davis and the Second Legislative District I have the honor of serving, I say, thank you thank you for being a part of the programming today. And I ask that you continue your good stewardship of civics, and I hope that into the future, that you may hold a seat up here. And I like to thank their teacher, Mr. Dorian, along with one of the Assistant Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Clark, who's also joined us here today.

MINORITY LEADER DERIGGI-WHITTON:

CLERK PULITZER: We have a quorum, sir.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Thank you.

At this point, before we go into our Agenda, we have a one hour period of public comment. It's one hour. For those who have submitted slips and do not get to speak during that hour, the legislators will listen to you after we finished our regular business.

The rules are that each person gets three minutes. Three minutes, and we time it. Understand, please, that if you go beyond the three minutes you're taking away from somebody else, and that's not

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right. So please do limit your comments accordingly. Also understand that this is not a question and answer session. It is merely a session during which we're here to listen to what you have to say.

Starting off with Mr. David
Tellerman.

MR. TELLERMAN: Hello, everyone. My name is David Tellerman and I am the director at New York Therapy. By now you are all aware of the crisis that preschool special education has been facing due to unchanged rates for 27 years. Today, I am here to thank all of you for your support in getting this rate changed. We had the pleasure of meeting many of you individually, and are truly appreciative for the concern you gave in order to help the preschoolers with disabilities. Thank you to all of you.

As you may be aware, there are hundreds of pre-school children not receiving their services on Long Island. The number one reason for this is that a

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large percentage of providers have left the field, and new graduates are not entering the field due to the rate. The ultimate goal is to get these children their services. The reimbursement for these services now is \$50 per session, which will be effective July 1st we are told. Unfortunately, this increase does not move the needle in terms of ultimately accomplishing this goal. The state average for reimbursement for services across all counties is \$61. At a minimum, the rate needs to be competitive with the state average in order to bring providers back into the field. Nassau County's current preschool contract expires in August of 2025. It's imperative that we start talking about a cost of living adjustment to be added into the new contract in order to get the reimbursement rate to the level that attracts providers and ultimately achieve the goal of all preschoolers with disabilities receiving their services. It

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took 27 years to get this changed. Let's not let this happen again.

Again, I greatly appreciate your support and look forward to continuing to work with all of you on this important matter.

Thank you very much.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Larry Johnston.

MR. JOHNSTON: Good afternoon. My name is Larry Johnston. I'm one of the owners of New York Therapy Placement Services, a company that has been a vendor with Nassau County since 1996 and been in business since 1986.

I'm here to say thank you to you. Thank you for the hard work, both individually and collectively, in bringing this preschool reimbursement rates for preschool services to a head and actually getting that rate increase. I can tell you it's going to make a difference. It's going to make a difference in retaining our current

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providers there. But as David said earlier, it's not going to help move the needle. It's not going to bring in that younger generation.

So the reality is, is that this rate increase is part of a contract that expires on August 30, 2025. That's 15 months away. It seems like a long time, but the reality is that it's not. The fact is you will look into start doing your funding sources for your 2025 budget and this contract is a part of that. So how do you structure a contract without putting the funding sources in there? We have to look towards making this contract, which is usually of a five year duration, sustainable structurally in a way that there's a cadence, a COLA, some type of metric that we as outside agencies, outside vendors, can help plan accordingly. We got to bring in that new generation of undergraduates that are going into the field of occupational, physical, and speech therapy. We can't do

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it without you.

When we first started coming here in late fall, you heard us. We educated you. Many of you didn't understand the background to this, but you listened to us. You came together both individually and collectively on both sides of the aisle, and you work together to get this done through the County Executive's office. And that was done mid budget cycle and mid contract term. Almost unheard of. That's a great effort on your part. But the reality is we need to not stop there because if you don't fund the contract accordingly, you're going to lose that effort that you all made. And ultimately what happens is these children are the one that suffer.

You have providers here that are constantly trying to do the passionate work that these children deserve to give them the outcomes that everyone here enjoys. They just want a quality of life like everybody else, and these services

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help do that. But they can't do it without the funding sources and the backup are you people.

So I'm asking you, we're always willing to sit down with you. And we've sat down with many of you, and we appreciate your time and effort in this, but this is something where we can come together collectively. It doesn't matter which side of the aisle. These children should not be forgotten anymore as they were for the past 27 years.

I appreciate all your help in this matter, and we're always willing to sit down with you and help you craft what we believe would be a fair and reasonable contract of five years in duration going forward.

Thank you very much.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Jody Finkel.

MS. FINKEL: Good afternoon, Jody Kass Finkel. I am the founder and coordinator of Concerned Citizens of New

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York '03, an ad hoc group that came together in early of 2023 to push for the ouster of George Santos from Congress. Once he was expelled on December 1st, we evolved into a good government group.

We're here today to talk about Bruce Blakeman and his armed militia in particular. When Bruce Blakeman ran, he said he was going to make many changes in the county. He said he was going to lower our taxes. He said he was going to fix the assessment system. He said he would reduce fees. Today on the agenda is the Red Light Camera Extension Home Rule Bill. In that there's nothing in there that's going to actually reduce the fees. Bruce Blakeman broke his promise to us. Another promise that he made to us.

Bruce Blakeman seems to be distracted by imaginary problems. Why do we need a militia in New York? In Nassau County? We don't. What's going on with the capital budget? Why hasn't the capital budget moved? I'm told it's six

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months late. We're holding up infrastructure. We're holding up jobs, hospice, potholes, sewage treatment plants. We need the Legislature. We need you to step in when Bruce Blakeman is stuck in this quagmire of his imagination, trying to solve problems that we don't have and letting problems that we do have get neglected. We need your help.

Many of us have reached out to Bruce Blakeman. We've reached out to the Comptroller's Office, we've reached out to the Inspector General's office, and we've reached out to our personal members of Congress. We've received almost no answers. It's outrageous. What is this militia for? What is the problem that we're trying to solve? How can this be happening in 2024? How can Bruce Blakeman, on his own, unilaterally create a militia for our county? Everybody saying it's not my responsibility. It's outrageous. It's absolutely outrageous.

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So I'm here today. I want to call on you -- I'm from Great Neck -- I want to call on you, Mazi Pilip, you're my legislator. Whether I voted for you or not, you still have a responsibility to represent me in this Body. And we've been calling your office, and we can't get any answers. We're told to call Blakeman's office. You stood up with him at the Holocaust Tolerance Center. You supported the militia. Why are you withholding the information from us about this militia? We deserve this information. And the more time that goes by with this wall of silence, the more fearful we're getting.

It's just it's terrible. We expect these answers, and if you don't have the answers, why not? If you're standing there supporting this very controversial initiative, you have to have that information. Otherwise, you're not doing your job. So I'm assuming you have this information, but you need to share it. Someone needs to share it with us. It's

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outrageous.

Anyway, I have more to say, but my time is up, so I'll just say thank you very much. And thank you especially to Delia DeRiggi-Whitton, your leadership.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Emily Raphael.

MS. RAPHAEL: Hi, I'm Emily Raphael. I'm from Plainview. I'm also with Concerned Citizens of New York 03. I'm also just about lifelong resident of Plainview. I was on the Board of education there.

One of the things about Concerned Citizens is we started with the focus on George Santos because we were outraged that someone so corrupt could claim to be representing our interests, and, in effect, we didn't have representation. And that's what I'd like to talk about today, is the issue of good government and representation. And I don't feel we're being represented in regard to this militia. I don't feel safer and neither

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2 do the people I know. In fact, I feel
3 less safe. In contrast to, I believe it
4 was Mr. Davis talking about the level of
5 training that police undergo and how
6 effective they were. And we don't really
7 have information about the training
8 that's going on for this militia. The
9 fact that it is going on without much
10 information out there also concerns me.
11 And I feel that by sort of ramming this
12 through where it's bypassing our
13 interests and input, we deserve to know
14 much more about what's being done, how
15 much it costs and who's ultimately
16 responsible. We should have known that
17 before it was implemented, not after the
18 fact. That's what should happen in good
19 representative government.

20 Thank you.

21 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Rabbi
22 Ariel Naveh.

23 RABBI NAVEH: Good afternoon. I'm
24 Rabbi Ralph Naveh, here on behalf of our
25 Long Island chapter of Bend the Arc

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Jewish Action, a progressive Jewish organization devoted to ending anti-Semitism and white supremacy.

I'm also a lifelong Islander, born and raised about 15 minutes southeast from here in Wantagh, where I currently live. I love this place fiercely, even when I found myself in disagreement with the people leading it. Disagreement is core to our tradition as Jews. It's baked into our holy texts.

But I'm not here today to talk about why I disagree with the County Executive and his most recent policy. I'm here today because I'm scared of it. For the past year, our chapter has been engaging in conversations about how to maintain our safety as antisemitic rhetoric and action are on the rise. These are challenging conversations as people in our community share their anxieties, apprehensions amid racial tensions. While the responses have varied, the consensus on what keeps us safe is building

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2 solidarity across communities here on
3 Long Island. Working under the notion
4 that our safety is bound up in the safety
5 of our neighbors, what does not make us
6 safer as Jews is an unregulated,
7 untrained, quasi governmental militia
8 held to hazy standards with little to no
9 oversight. This sort of action, in fact,
10 has a dark precedent in our history, and
11 the County Executive's manipulative use
12 of the Holocaust center as a backdrop for
13 his press conference about this militia
14 was a particularly cruel insult to the
15 memory of that history.

16 Unfortunately, this administration's
17 lack of transparency about this plan
18 shows that he is not at all invested in
19 real community, but rather only in
20 stoking fear. Let's say to Giangregorio,
21 who is my legislator, you should be
22 appalled at how little insight we have
23 into how County Executive Blakeman plans
24 to fund this initiative, especially as a
25 member of the Budget Committee. He

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rather close NUMC than forgo an untrained group of armed vigilantes? This county already has over 2500 police officers. Is their service that woefully insufficient?

It is a mark of concern that our leadership is scared to be held to account, and the 75 members of our chapter who have already petitioned the IG's office with these questions would agree.

I'm very proud of the work that I get to do in this position. I urge that Legislator Giangregorio, and all of the rest of the legislators here ask these vital questions about what really keeps us safe, schools, housing and healthcare, not an armed militia and pitting neighbor against neighbor. Thank you so much.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Kim Keiserman.

MS. KEISERMAN: Good afternoon, everyone. My name is Kim Keiserman. I'm also a proud member of Concerned Citizens of New York 03, a Nassau County resident

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for 20 years and a candidate for State Senate.

We're here today because Nassau County is facing a leadership crisis, and that's the aspect of this I want to focus on. This is a crisis caused by Bruce Blakeman's constant distractions. His affinity for culture wars over substance and his inability to deliver results for the people he represents. While our County Executive spends his time trying to cozy up to Donald Trump and get his name in the paper, Nassau County residents are feeling the pain of failed governance. Despite his campaign promises, three years later, our tax assessment system is still broken with no signs of meaningful improvement.

Our affordability crisis is getting worse every single day, with our children unable to move back to the communities where they grew up.

Nassau County Medical Center is on the brink of collapse, and instead of

1
2 finding solutions, Blakeman decided to
3 send out a politically charged mailer
4 using our tax dollars.

5 And perhaps worst of all, we're now
6 just weeks away from having an armed
7 militia of inadequately trained civilians
8 on standby to be deployed at the County
9 Executive's will. This is what I mean by
10 a leadership crisis. At a time when
11 public safety is top of mind for
12 residents across Long Island, Blakeman's
13 armed militia is particularly. Alarming
14 when it comes to keeping our residents
15 safe, let's make one thing abundantly
16 clear empowering inadequately trained
17 civilians to use their personal firearms
18 and an emergency is a dangerous and
19 ill-conceived idea. In fact, it will only
20 put the lives of our uniformed officers,
21 our families, and our children at greater
22 risk by adding more guns onto our streets
23 in an unstable environment.

24 Our county and state police are
25 already some of the best and most

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2 equipped in the nation, and if there was
3 a need for additional support, the
4 National Guard stands at the ready to
5 deal with exactly the type of situation
6 the County Executive claims to be
7 concerned about. The last thing any of
8 these law enforcement bodies needs is a
9 group of armed civilians roaming the
10 streets without competent oversight or
11 direction.

12 Thank you very much.

13 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Reid
14 Goldsmith.

15 MR. GOLDSMITH: Before I begin, I
16 ask the Presiding Officer if he could
17 please ask the honorable legislators to
18 take a look at their packets. I went and
19 at great expense and great cost and great
20 time and provided a packet for each
21 legislator so they could understand what
22 I'm talking about.

23 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: They will
24 be in the minutes as well.

25 MR. GOLDSMITH: I submitted a copy

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for the minutes also.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Go on,
please.

MR. GOLDSMITH: Thank you very much,
sir.

To the Honorable Legislators of
Nassau County, my name is Reid Goldsmith.
I reside in the 16th Legislative
District, Arnold Drucker's district.

As a brief introduction, I am a
retired court reporter from New York
State Queens Supreme Court with 40 years
in the system. I'm a lifelong resident of
Syosset, having moved out here when I was
six years old and bought my parents house
so they could retire comfortably to
Florida. I am presently a teacher at
Plaza College in Forest Hills. I am a
former Scoutmaster of Syosset, Boy Scouts
of America Troop 170. I am president of
Syosset Public Library's Board of
Trustees. I am president of the New York
State Court Reporters Association.

I have always cared about people and

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their welfare, especially senior citizens, considering that I am one now also; I am 69 years old. I am requesting your assistance in unraveling the red tape bureaucracy in this matter.

As a senior citizen who used to walk the stretch of Woodbury Road, a county road in Plainview, New York, the sidewalk has been a health hazard. A multimillion dollar lawsuit just waiting for someone to fall, attempting to traverse this horrendous and dangerous stretch of sidewalk located on the north side of Woodbury Road in Plainview, between East Court and Marketplace. I have stopped walking this route. I have seen mothers with children in strollers being forced to step into busy Woodbury Road. People walking their pets must endure hazards for both themselves and their pets.

Everybody talks about health and safety for residents who pay high taxes. Where are those concerns here? I have complained for over five years,

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encompassing the Curran administration to the Blakeman Administration without success. I tried to work through my county legislator also to no avail, despite having met representatives from his office who took pictures while walking the area, agreeing that it was a health hazard to all residents, not only senior citizens. I have been referred to the Highway Department responsible for making the repairs and told they were unable to effectuate any repairs due to the regulations governing this area.

In short, this location is within Town of Oyster Bay. The sidewalk in question is at the edge of the rear yards of multiple homes, which face into the neighborhood while abutting Woodbury Road, a county road. There are wooden stockade fences separating the rear yards from the sidewalk, many in disrepair and most likely the homeowner feels his or her responsibility ends at the wooden fence. However, according to the TOB, the

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homeowner is responsible for the sidewalk adjacent to all sides of his property.

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The conundrum occurs when the sidewalks are abutting a county road such as

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Woodbury Road. The TOB claims sidewalks

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fall into the County of Nassau. The

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County of Nassau claims it falls into

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TOB, and for five years this has

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continued and exacerbated due to weather

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changes and more deterioration.

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I am pleading for your assistance.

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Thank you for listening to me. Thank you.

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LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Reid, I hear

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you well, and we know each other very

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well. And you've been sending me these

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photos, and I've taken some of these

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photos myself as I drive by this

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particular location. I've forwarded on to

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the various people at the Administration.

21

We've had meetings, several members of us

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on this Legislature, Legislator Ferretti,

23

Legislator Walker. Believe me, we all

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want to get it done. There's issues that

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involve the County Attorney's Office, New

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2 York State. I think we all recognize, at
3 least the legislators on this dais,
4 recognize the importance of public safety
5 and how this particular location, I'm
6 well aware of, and it is disgraceful. It
7 is a health hazard. We're trying our
8 best. We are met with certain obstacles
9 that are beyond our control, but each one
10 of us are endeavoring to get this taken
11 care of, Reid. We're not ignoring you and
12 other residents in these communities, and
13 all of our districts who have problems
14 with sidewalks.

15 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Nancy
16 Youngfert.

17 MS. YOUNGFERT: Good afternoon. My
18 name is Nancy Youngfert. I'm the
19 president of the Franklin Square
20 Historical Society, and I live in John
21 Giuffre's district. I was here in
22 December, and I don't know if you
23 remember, but I was pretty hot under the
24 collar because I hadn't gotten any
25 information at all about the Covid boost

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2 money. The second grant that was for not
3 for profits, and John assured me that we
4 would hear something soon. I went home
5 and I said to my husband, if John said,
6 it's going to happen, he's a member of
7 the Historical Society, we're going to
8 trust that it's going to happen.

9 In March, before we had our annual
10 dinner, we got a call from John's office
11 telling us that the grant had been given
12 to us. So I'm here to say thank you for
13 keeping your word and to thank the
14 Legislature for voting for it.

15 The money is going to allow us to
16 build, begin the building of a classroom
17 on the back of the historical society. So
18 thank you. You kept your word to us. The
19 Covid money is going to be well used. I
20 appreciate your efforts.

21 Thank you. All right.

22 LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: I just want to
23 thank both you and your husband, Bill,
24 for all of your work in the district,
25 trying to educate residents about our

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history. So thank you. God bless you.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Susan
Chen.

MS. CHEN: Honorable
representatives, good afternoon. My name
is Susan Chen and I am a police PSA at
NCPD. I want to thank you in advance for
your time.

I hope you can help ensure that the
vesting terms of the new CSEA contract
remain as they were under which we were
hired. The change in the minimum vesting
period from ten years to 20 years have
brought me extreme anxiety.

I am here today to tell you my short
story. I graduated with a Bachelor of
Science degree in Industrial Engineering
from SUNY Buffalo, and I worked as a
manufacturing robotics engineer at
Standard Motors products. I became a stay
at home mom after the birth of my three
children, and 24 years later, when they
became independent, I made a decision to
rejoin the workforce. I spent a year and

1
2 a half studying radiation therapy at NCC,
3 and I was accepted at the Sloan Kettering
4 Radiation Therapy Program. The starting
5 salary of radiation therapy therapist in
6 2018 was \$90,000, about \$63,000 more than
7 the \$26,500 starting salary of a PSA.

8 Despite that huge difference, what
9 made me comfortable with my job offer was
10 because during the onboarding process
11 with the NCPD, I was explicitly told by
12 the personnel and the County Bureau not
13 to worry about the lack of a union
14 contract and was ensured the terms of
15 employment, my employment will be defined
16 by the expired contract.

17 I was energized and determined to
18 complete my 20 years of service. I even
19 made detailed plans for every step and
20 had taken many tests to advance my
21 career. I believe the assurance given to
22 me by the NCPD that if I were to guard
23 and complete my ten year vesting period,
24 the safety net of healthcare and pension
25 would be guaranteed even if something

1
2 goes wrong with my health or that of my
3 family, that may prevent me from reaching
4 my 20 year anniversary.

5 For the last six years, I dutifully
6 and happily worked for Nassau County. If
7 I had chosen to be a radiation therapist,
8 ten years of salary difference would
9 likely have exceeded \$600,000. But I
10 thought it was a fair exchange for the
11 promise safety net of vested healthcare
12 benefits earned with my hard work.

13 Now the safety net is gone through
14 no fault of my own. My life has now
15 turned upside down. A healthy desire to
16 complete my 20 years has become a fear of
17 not being able to complete the 20 years.
18 Many of my colleagues have made similar,
19 irreversible, life-changing decisions
20 based on the assurance of a ten year
21 vesting and the belief in the law.

22 I hope that you can find in your
23 heart to stand with us and help the
24 grandfather, all of us, to the agreed
25 terms in the contract and under which we

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were hired.

Thank you for your attention.

MS. CALVO: Honorable
representatives, my name is Ann Calvo.
I'm an administrative assistant at the
Police Department. I've been working for
the county for 26 years, so I'm not
personally affected by this change in
vesting terms. I'm here to lend my voice
and support of those impacted. You have
heard from the previous speaker, Susan, a
colleague of mine. She represents one of
the many county colleagues who, like
myself, wants to work as long as we can
in service to the County. But the new
contract sacrifices the many workers like
Susan and keep them unvested and,
therefore, at risk for ten years more
than what they were promised.

There is another group they have
served more than ten years before the
change of vesting takes place in 2026.
They will be forced into premature
retirement unless they are willing to

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2 become unvested. Many don't want to
3 retire, but fear that any unforeseen
4 interruption would prevent them from
5 reaching their 20 year mark. For them,
6 premature retirement kneecap their
7 careers and imposes painful financial
8 penalties, speaking nothing of the County
9 losing its best workers in their prime.

10 So for these two groups, in my
11 opinion as an observer, the County
12 unfairly rescinded the contract of ten
13 year vesting and gave them nothing in
14 return. Rather than sacrificing only
15 these coworkers, it seems much more
16 equitable if the terms they signed up for
17 are grandfathered in as originally
18 contracted.

19 With the remainder of my allotted
20 time, Susan will read as many names as
21 she can of those affected. It is a long
22 list. I don't think we'll be able to
23 finish. I hope that you honorable
24 representatives will have a chance to
25 meet them, one civilian servant to

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another, and look them in the eye like you can with Susan here, and explain to her and them why they are the only ones to be sacrificed.

Thank you for your attention.

(Whereupon, Ms. Chen proceeds to read multiple names into the record.)

MS. CALVO: I'm sorry. You can tell them there's about 167. I'm not going to finish in time. I am so sorry, but thank you for your attention. And seriously, I hope that you can stand with us. Thank you, I appreciate it.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Susan Naftol.

MS. NAFTOL: My name is Susan Naftol. I'm also part of this group of people in black. We're in mourning the loss of our ten year investment. I work at the Department of Health. I have signatures here that I'm going to hand in several hundred signatures. What we can gather quickly.

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Anyway, I will be at the eight year mark in June of 2026, and we'll have to work till I'm 75 to achieve the new 20 year investment under this new contract. Today I'm speaking not only for myself, but also on behalf of my brothers and sisters of CSEA County workers regarding the change in vestment from 10 to 20 years. The union, who we pay dues to, and Nassau County, who we pay taxes to have not been helpful with correcting this.

In the legislative meeting on September 18, 2023, some legislators suggested that there must be other ways to save the equivalent money. A *Newsday* editorial suggested the same thing to quote, "There is a relatively small number of CSEA members who are unfairly affected in the sense that they may have made prudent life planning decisions several years ago to forgo better paying jobs just to retire after ten years with health benefits. The new 20 year rule is something they had no way to anticipate.

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Perhaps some accommodation is possible for the 100 or so affected workers."

With a budget as large, as large as Nassau County's and an affected group this small, we remain confident that you can find a way to accomplish this. At that meeting, you told us that you agreed with us, that we were wronged and that you were going to make it right. Here we are eight months later and there has been no movement. We are asking today for you to consider acting on a sense of fairness, and on the sentiments expressed by legislators at that meeting on September 18th. We are hoping that somebody in the Legislature will acknowledge the fundamental unfairness of this, and will initiate a memorandum of understanding, or an amendment to grandfather us into the original agreement in the contract when we were hired.

This contract, as it now stands, will have to be altered as our medical

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insurance will be changing in January. We are unsure of what other changes will need to be made to this contract, but we see this as an opportunity. An opportunity to make it right for those of us who have been unfairly impacted.

Thank you for your time. Thank you for your consideration. I'm going to hand these in. Who do I hand them into?

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Hand them to the clerk right over here at this table (indicating).

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Theresa Michelini.

MS. MICHELINI: Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen. My name is Theresa Mmichelini, and I'm a PSA proudly serving Nassau County for the past six and a half years. I joined this department with the understanding that after ten years of dedicated service, I would be entitled to medical benefits for life. The promise was a crucial factor in my decision to accept the position, even though it meant

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2 accepting a lower salary compared to
3 other opportunities. I made a long term
4 commitment to this department trusting in
5 the assurance of future benefits that
6 would provide security for me and my
7 family. However, the recent contract
8 changes have jeopardized this promise.
9 The new terms indicate that I, and others
10 in my position, will no longer receive
11 these benefits after reaching the ten
12 year mark. This change undermines the
13 foundation upon which we based our
14 professional, and personal plans.

15 The impact of this decision is
16 profound. It means my spouse and I will
17 be forced to continue working well into
18 our late 70s, pushing towards the age of
19 70 just to ensure we can maintain a
20 decent lifestyle in our retirement. This
21 is not the future we envisioned when I
22 made the commitment to serve this
23 community.

24 I urge you to reconsider and restore
25 the medical benefits that were originally

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2 promised. Our dedication and hard work
3 over the years have been based on this
4 assurance. To alter the terms now is not
5 just a breach of trust, but a significant
6 setback for those of us who have
7 sacrificed in the hope of a secure
8 future.

9 Thank you for your time and
10 consideration. I hope you will take this
11 plea to heart and take action to
12 reinstate the benefits that we were
13 assured when we joined the Nassau County
14 Police Department.

15 Thank you for your time.

16 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Tami
17 Ellinport.

18 MS. ELLINPORT: Hi, Legislators. I'm
19 a disabled veteran that served in the
20 United States Air Force. While serving my
21 country, my arm was almost severed off. I
22 decided to take a job at the VA being I
23 love being around my fellow veterans.
24 Fast forward several canvas letters from
25 the Civil Service, where I gave up my job

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at the VA to take a job with a much

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smaller paycheck, but with better

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benefits, especially if I should retire

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after ten years. That benefit was

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recently ripped out from under me and

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about 170 fellow CSEA Local 830 members.

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My contract was changed where I now have

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to work until I am 77 years old to

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continue my medical coverage. Instead of

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me working two more years when this

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revision kicks in, I have to work 12 more

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years.

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I feel those of us that were hired

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under the current contract should be

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grandfathered in to receive our medical

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benefits after being vested ten years,

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not the revised contract to have to work

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20 years. I am asking you to be fair with

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these 170 members that took these jobs

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for very little pay under a contract that

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stated, we are vested at ten years. Thank

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you.

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PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Richard

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Clobery.

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MINORITY LEADER DERIGGI-WHITTON:

Howard, before everyone leaves, I just want to mention that when this vote did go through for the Union, we did request that the Administration take a look at those that were left in this gap. And I'm very sorry that you are where you are. And we were assured that the financial impact was being reviewed and that they were going to do what they could to at least advise you of the status. I'm sorry that it's already this many months that you've been worried about this, but I am going to request in writing again an official status of where we are with this, because this is really terrible and I'm sorry.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Richard, go ahead.

MR. CLOLERY: I like a thank you guys for your time. I'm also very worried about this whole new militia thing. I keep hearing disturbing news about this sort of thing.

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Not just that. I mean, also, affordability has gone straight to the ninth circle. I keep getting complaints from my customers, "Richard, why is everything going up?" I kept telling them I'm just the enforcer, not its creator.

Am I boring you guys? Anyway, getting back to what I was saying. I personally do believe affordability is tied up by many things affordable housing and especially affordable transportation. I personally do believe that we need to increase funding for the buses. That way NICE can increase and can restore bus lines that were cut and that people can get around. I mean, I shop here too. I go to the movies here, I get my haircut at the Mall. Actually, I didn't last month, but that's neither here or there.

Anyway, thank you for your time.
Have a good day.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Pearl
Jacobs.

MS. JACOBS: Pear Jacobs, Uniondale,

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President of Nostrand Gardens Civic Association.

I was prepared to talk regarding another issue today, but this morning I received a call from a neighbor and also a member of my civic association to speak about traffic and how horrendous it is in Nassau County. So I just put a little something together.

On May 9th, Governor Hochul signed Sammy's Law, a law that will allow the New York State Department of Transportation to set lower limits on individual streets to as low as ten miles per hour. Sammy was a 12-year-old who was struck and killed by a driver in Park Slope, Brooklyn, while crossing a roadway.

Here in Nassau County, Ethan Falkowitz and Drew Hassenbein were killed last year by a drunk driver while traveling home from a tennis match. The driver of the vehicle was traveling at 95mph and had cocaine in his system. From

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a legislative perspective, what laws have been enacted to help drive down vehicle fatality fatalities after Ethan and Drew's deaths last year? I know you don't answer the questions. I just put it out there.

Our district attorney, Anne Donnelly, has vowed to prosecute these dangerous and impaired drivers to the full extent of the law. However, as the lawmakers for the County, you must step up and do your part to decrease these preventable tragedies here in Nassau County. By sitting idly and doing nothing makes you just as guilty as the dangerous and destructive drivers who are driving up these fatalities.

Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Meta Mereday.

MS. MEREDAY: (Speaking while approaching microphone not captured.)

Folks are talking about safety. I'm definitely against the militia. And what

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safety are residents feeling when they come here and it's a metal gate you can't drive through anymore? I mean, do we get to have a metal gate and a police officer in front of our homes to feel safe? Our tax dollars are paying for this. But yet and still, there was not one handicapped spot for me there, I just literally got a shot in my back. I had to open a gate to walk all the way around to come in here. Otherwise the nice officers say, well, there's parking across the street. Sometimes I have a hard time just walking to get here. That's a problem.

Where does one begin? Every time I read *Newsday*, I'm in fear. I'm in shock. I'm in disgust. I'm in dismay. And that's just the highlights. Where is the diversity audit for Nassau County, which is supposed to be the standard bearer for some type of determination for inclusion on business opportunities in this county? Where is it? There is no inclusion when it comes down to minority women, veteran

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businesses in this county. But there's no diversity audit, which is supposed to be the standard bearer. Why? Because you already know that the report is going to scare the bejesus out of people.

Why is it that the Sands can promote itself to people and basically try to reel them in, thinking we can do a better job with regard to procurement opportunities, employment opportunities, and diversity? Guess what, Nassau County? They can.

You've got a four plus billion dollar budget that is an embarrassment. Our roads are a disgrace. You have a facility, the medical center, if you can't take care of it, give it to the state. Stop talking about it; be about it.

We've got to stand down tomorrow for military veterans. I dare most of you to show up to see the real issue that's impacting our veterans who are homeless, who are jobless, who are basically

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hopeless at this point. Forty four are committing suicide or attempting to commit suicide every day. Twenty four out of that 44 are by self-inflicted, an overdose or "accidents", because the families don't want to address the fact that you have a suicide situation. You got a comparable and competent inspector general. Why doesn't she have a contract? Or do you want to wait for *Newsday* to finally do some kind of investigative journalism, to find out how many more people are stealing our tax dollars?

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The Department of Interior needs to come here to address the issue that you all want to think you're going to the bank with this casino.

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The plume is growing, people. It's not just in Hicksville and Bethpage anymore. It's in Plainview. It's in East Meadow. It's spreading to Uniondale and Garden City, along with the dioxanes that are there. I'm reaching out to the Department of the Interior.

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For God's sakes, let's finally do something for the residents in this county and this community and step up, because we have no voice, we have no representation. There is no equitable distribution of my resources.

I'm about to take my seat, but you let somebody read some names for about a minute and a half, and I'm not going to match that, but I'm going to come close to it.

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PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: We're going to go right to our items now. We have a number of consent items. These items are those that have gone through Committees and the Majority and Minority have agreed that they require no further discussion or debate. And so I'm going to read them and we'll vote on them:

(Whereupon, all members of
the Full Legislature respond in
favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any
opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Those
items are unanimous.

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PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Now we have a number of other items that we've got to go through.

Number one, which is a public hearing on proposed Resolution 53, which is a Resolution Consenting to the Acquisition and Use By the Locust Valley Cemetery Association of Certain Land For Cemetery Purposes.

Motion by Legislator Ferretti, seconded by Legislator Solages to open the hearing.

All those in favor, please say, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of the Full Legislature respond in favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: The hearing is now open.

MR. KALNITSKY: My name is Gregory

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Kalnitsky. I'm with for Forchelli Deegan Terran LLP, Earle Ovington, Uniondale, New York.

I'm here on behalf of the Locust Valley Cemetery Association, Inc. It was founded as a not for profit cemetery corporation in 1917, and, as such, is subject to New York State's not for profit corporation law. That law requires the cemetery to come to the Legislature if it seeks to augment the property that it has. And that's the reason why we're here today.

We're looking for consent for the acquisition for two reasons:

Number one, to continue to service the community through the sale of additional graves.

But most importantly, the second reason, which is to ensure that when the cemetery runs out of property, that its endowment is sufficient to provide an income such that the cemetery can be maintained perpetually because there

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won't be any more money coming in.

Unless the Legislature has any questions, that's the sum of the presentation. Thank you very much.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any questions?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any debate or discussion?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any public comment?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Hearing none.

All those in favor of this item, please say, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of the Rules Committee respond in favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any

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opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: The item
is passed unanimously.

Motion to close the hearing. That is
made by Legislator Gaylor, seconded by
Legislator Davis.

All those in favor of closing the
hearing, please say, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of
the Full Legislature respond in
favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any
opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: The
hearing is closed.

Now we will go to the Resolution 53,
which is a resolution consenting to the
acquisition of use of the land for
cemetery purposes.

Motion by Legislator Giuffre,

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seconded by Legislator Mule.

All those in favor of this item,
please say, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of
the Full Legislature respond in
favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any
opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: That item
is unanimous.

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PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Resolution 71, request the Legislature of the State of New York to enact the governor to approve an act to authorize the County of Nassau to alienate and sell parklands to Lakeside Inn.

Motion on this is made by Legislator Goetz and seconded by Legislator Mullaney.

MR. K. WALSH: Good afternoon. Legislators. Kevin Walsh, members of real estate services. This is Item 71. A resolution to authorize, in essence, a Home Rule message for a small piece of property adjacent to the Milburn Pond Park in Baldwin for a land swap. Two small parcels. I think they're both under 250ft².

Any questions?

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Before we even get to the questions, I want to note that Legislator Mule has recused herself from this item and has left the chamber. She's not taking part in the debate and

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discussion.

Any questions?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Thank you,
Kevin.

All those in favor of Resolution 71,
please say, "Aye".

Aye.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Aye.

LEGISLATOR MULLANEY: Aye.

LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: Aye.

LEGISLATOR STRAUSS: Aye.

LEGISLATOR PILIP: Aye.

LEGISLATOR MCKEVITT: Aye.

LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Aye.

LEGISLATOR GOETZ: Aye.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Aye.

LEGISLATOR KENNEDY: Aye.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Opposed?

MINORITY LEADER DERIGGI-WHITTON:

Nay.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Nay.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Nay.

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LEGISLATOR DAVIS: Nay.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Nay.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: The vote
is 11 to five with one recusal.

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PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Next item is Resolution 72, which requests the Legislature of the State of New York to enact and the Governor to approve an act to amend Chapter 19, Local Laws of 2009, amending the vehicle and traffic laws and other laws relating to adjudications and owner liability for violation of traffic control signals indications in relation to extending the provisions of such chapter.

We have a motion by Legislator Strauss and seconded by Legislator Kennedy.

I would note for the record that this is not an item which is discussing the fees, it is merely extending the program altogether for the having these adjudications and liability for violation. It has nothing to do with the fees. Do we have anyone here for the Administration?

MR. RICH: Good afternoon, Dave Rich, Assistant Executive Director of the

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Traffic Parking Violations Agency.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Yes. Will you tell us why you want to extend the program and what the program has done so far and it's success or failure and what it's accomplished.

MR. RICH: The program first started in 2009. We went live in August of 2009. We've been running the program for about 15 years. Currently, we have 100 intersections monitored with approximately 308 cameras.

Every year since the inception of the program, we've seen a reduction in total crashes. The first year we saw a 9% reduction, second year, 21%. Average is about roughly less than 30% that we've seen in total reductions from the time that we looked at the intersections prior to installing equipment to having the equipment in place.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. Yes.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: How are you, sir?

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MR. RICH: Okay. How are you doing, sir?

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LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Good, good.

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Just a quick question. Does your office have any concerns about the current pending litigation that's determining that some of these fees are excessive? Does that concern you in terms of extending this program?

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MR. RICH: I cannot speak to that. That would be a matter for the County Attorney's Office.

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LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Okay.

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But there is a correlation between the fees that are charged to the taxpayers and the administration of the office; would you agree with that?

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MR. RICH: I cannot comment on that.

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LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: You don't know where the money goes to in terms of the fines and the program, how it affects TPVA in any way?

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MR. RICH: TPVA is responsible for collecting the fines and fees that are

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assessed, and it turns the monies over to the County.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Do you have any occasion to use the fines that come in for the administration of your office?

MR. RICH: That would be a question for Budget. I cannot comment on that.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: All right. Thanks.

MINORITY LEADER DERIGGI-WHITTON: We would really like to request a hearing on the fees. I think Public Safety should be involved. But I know this isn't your privy, but I think that we should absolutely have a hearing. I think that the bottom line is we really need a hearing on the fees. We are only extending the contract, but the fees are included. So I think that it's important that we have a hearing now. With the Public Safety Committee, who ranking for Legislator Bynoe and Chaired by Pat Mullaney.

First of all, I think we need public

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hearings. I don't think we've had one in the last five months.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: We had one about two minutes ago.

MINORITY LEADER DERIGGI-WHITTON: I think a real public hearing where we address an issue that is something that is a cost to the taxpayers and something that is being brought to our attention as being a question as to whether or not it's in line, and that's what we have to verify.

MR. RICH: Again, this is just a request to extend the current legislation by five years as it sunsets in December of this year.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Legislator Ferretti.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Hey, Mr. Rich, how are you?

MR. RICH: Okay. How are you doing, sir?

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Just out of curiosity. Going back, were you there in

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2009?

MR. RICH: Yes.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Okay. Leading up to 2010 -- it was started in 2010 or '09, when did the cameras actually get turned on?

MR. RICH: Cameras actually went on August of '09.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Okay. Leading up to that, were the number of traffic accidents increasing at those intersections; do we know?

MR. RICH: No. We saw a reduction.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: I'm not saying after the cameras were turned on. I'm saying leading up to the cameras being turned on.

MR. RICH: These sites were chosen based on crash statistics. So the Committee had actually chosen sites that had high crash numbers. And that's where the camera equipment was installed.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: So back in 2009, when those cameras were installed

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in those intersections, were the numbers of accidents going up year over year at those intersections?

MR. RICH: Prior to the installation?

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Prior to the installation.

MR. RICH: I think what happened is they used the stats from a four year average, so I couldn't tell whether or not they were increasing or decreasing prior to the installation.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: All right. Do the intersections change sporadically where the cameras are?

MR. RICH: At this time, no. It's still the same 100 intersections that we originally installed the equipment.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: So the intersections that had cameras back in 2009 are still the same exact intersections today?

MR. RICH: Yes.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Okay. If they

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were to be changed, do you need authorization from the State? How does that work?

MR. RICH: No. Basically there would be some folks that would look at the crash data and to see if there are other intersections that warrant the relocation of existing equipment.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Since 2009, has the number changed in terms of intersections that have the cameras? Have the increased/decreased/stay the same?

MR. RICH: By State legislation, we're only allowed to have 100 intersections monitored. So we're still at that 100.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: And we had 100 back in August of 2009?

MR. RICH: I'm not sure what year, I want to say maybe 2014. Used to originally be 50 intersections, and then the State approved an additional 50 intersections after that time.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: In 2014.

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MR. RICH: Roughly around 2014.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: All right.

About ten years ago.

MR. RICH: Yes.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: All right.

Thank you.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Thank you very
much, Chair.

Good afternoon, sir.

MR. RICH: Good afternoon.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: How are you
doing?

Can you tell me, in 2011, what was
the total amount for the fines for a red
light camera ticket?

MR. RICH: I don't have that
information in front of me.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: I have
information that shows that it was \$65;
is that Correct?

MR. RICH: It sounds right, but I
can't definitively say yes.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: And then 2012,
do you know what that rose to?

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MR. RICH: I don't have that --

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Eighty dollars,
and then in '15 to 95 and 2017, 150.
That's the current fine, \$150?

MR. RICH: I believe so, yes.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: New York City
also has red light cameras; is that
correct?

MR. RICH: Yes.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: And do you know
how much they fine for New York City red
light camera?

MR. RICH: I'm unfamiliar.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: You're
unfamiliar. The number \$50?

MR. RICH: I couldn't tell you. I
haven't gotten a violation in New York
City, so I'm not sure.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Okay, so for
the same offense going through a red
light intersection, whether there's
traffic or not, in Nassau County, the
fine is 150 and in New York City, it's
\$50.

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Do you know how much is in Suffolk County, sir?

MR. RICH: No, I don't.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Is there any reason to justify the higher fine in Nassau County as opposed to New York City?

MR. RICH: I cannot speak on that.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Are the streets in Nassau County more dangerous than the streets in New York City?

MR. RICH: I definitely would not have knowledge of that.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Thank you very much.

MR. RICH: Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. Anyone else?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: All right. Hearing none. All those in favor of extending this program, please say, "Aye".

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Aye.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Aye.

LEGISLATOR MULLANEY: Aye.

LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: Aye.

LEGISLATOR STRAUSS: Aye.

LEGISLATOR PILIP: Aye.

LEGISLATOR MCKEVITT: Aye.

LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Aye.

LEGISLATOR GOETZ: Aye.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Aye.

LEGISLATOR KENNEDY: Aye.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any

opposed to extending the program?

MINORITY LEADER DERIGGI-WHITTON:

Nay.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Nay.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Nay.

LEGISLATOR DAVIS: Nay.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Nay.

LEGISLATOR MULE: Nay.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: So the

vote is 11 to 6.

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PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Next.
Item 73, Resolution requesting the
Legislature of the State of New York to
enact the Governor to approve an act to
amend the Private Housing Finance Law in
relation to authorizing the granting of
an additional real property tax exemption
for certain redevelopment company
projects within the County of Nassau.

(Whereupon, off the record
discussion.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: I'm told
that we have some action on the state
level, so we'll have to wait just a
little bit.

What we're going to do while we're
waiting is I'm going to recess the
Legislature, and we're going to have a
Rules Committee meeting.

(Whereupon, recess 3:02
p.m.-3:20 p.m.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: The
Legislature is back in session. We'll now
consider Resolution 73, which, again,

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requests the Legislature and State of New York to enact the Governor to approve an act to amend the private housing finance law in relation to authorizing the granting of an additional real property tax exemption for certain redevelopment company projects within this County of Nassau.

Motion by Legislator Strauss, seconded by Legislator Gaylor.

Now we have a motion to establish an emergency, and that motion is made by Legislator Kennedy and seconded by Legislator Bynoe.

All those in favor of the emergency, please say, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of the Full Legislature respond in favor with, "Aye".)

CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Any opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: The emergency has been established.

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Now we have a motion to amend. The amendment amends the Assembly Bill number. Motion on that by Legislator Mullaney, seconded by Legislator Goetz.

All those in favor of the amendment, please say, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of the Full Legislature respond in favor with, "Aye".)

CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Any opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: The amendment is established.

Now, back onto the original item. Anyone have any debate or discussion on that, as amended?

LEGISLATOR MCKEVITT: If I can just explain what has happened here. This was a matter we discussed in the Committees about two weeks ago. And this is for a number of "Golden Age" housing complexes throughout the county, which, due to a quirk in the private housing finance law,

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2 many of these projects would wind up
3 losing a good deal of their tax
4 exemptions within the next year or so.
5 And some of their taxes would literally
6 go up by about 2,100%. So this would be
7 a fix in the New York state law just for
8 Nassau County. And what happened was
9 originally one Assembly member was doing
10 the bill that has been changed. So
11 literally, thanks to Mr. Drucker's
12 assistance, we literally got the new bill
13 number moments ago. And with that, we
14 were able to put in the new bill number,
15 which, by the way, passed the Senate
16 Housing Committee last week. And my
17 understanding is that this should now go
18 through both houses of Legislature within
19 the next week or two. So I want to thank
20 everyone's assistance for making this
21 happen.

22 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: I just want to
23 take an opportunity and I want to thank
24 Legislator McKeivitt for bringing this to
25 the whole Legislative Body. Many of us,

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2 or a few of us on this Body were aware of
3 this problem over the past year from
4 residents in our community who live in
5 these particular developments. And
6 although we knew it was a problem that
7 had to be addressed by the State, I want
8 to thank Legislator McKeVitt for pushing
9 it as a priority on this legislature to
10 get the Home Rule. I want to thank you
11 also for your graciousness and making
12 this an entire bipartisan measure, which
13 it is for all of us. But I want to thank
14 you, Tom, for your efforts on this as
15 well.

16 LEGISLATOR MCKEVITT: I want to
17 thank you as well, too. And again,
18 fortunately, I've had to use my own
19 friends from Albany once again to make
20 this happen as well. So we're not there
21 yet, but hopefully with all the
22 cooperation, this will be done in the
23 next couple of weeks and get it done.

24 MINORITY LEADER DERIGGI-WHITTON:
25 Well, we're happy you still have your

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friends and we're also happy to work in a bipartisan way. So thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: All those in favor of this item as amended, please say, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of the Full Legislature respond in favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Legislature Goetz makes a motion adjourn. Legislature Davis seconds that motion.

All those in favor of adjourning, please say, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of the Full Legislature respond in favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

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PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: We are
adjourned.

(Whereupon, the Full
Legislature meeting is
adjourned, 3:22 p.m.)
