Nearby, at the former incinerator and compost site, designs are being prepared through a grant with NYS DOS to complement the adjacent 19-acre Maccarone Stadium and add amenities including 0.6 miles of new public waterfront access, pathways, landscaping, parking, and signage. The City has a very active recreational program and seeks to incorporate the adjacent properties, such as the public works yard, to meet the needs of its residents and programs. Disposition activities shall include, but not be limited to, survey work, title work, legal fees, environmental assessments, and appraisals and other professional consultant fees associated with the sale of the property.
