In addition, a parcel currently housing the Glen Cove Child Day Care Center located on One Arterial Highway in the BOA study area is also being considered for disposition activities with relocation of the daycare in accordance with recommendations made in the DOS funded Step 3 BOA implementation phase of the Brownfield Opportunity Area (BOA) grant for the Orchard Neighborhood and the Sea Cliff Avenue Industrial Area. The Implementation Phase will carry out opportunities identified for economic development such as green space, transportation analysis, community uses, as well as transit oriented development. Disposition of these parcels will remove blight and provide economic development. Tegerman Schools has expressed interest in purchasing the front portion of the Coles School property to be utilized as a new location for their Middle School Program (Grades 6-9) for students with developmental disabilities. The total capacity of the Middle School Program is 156 students with approximately 75 staff members and students transported by mini bus to the school. The City would retain the rear portion of the property for community beneficial use, with continued analysis of alternatives ongoing as part of the BOA. The CDA also anticipates disposition activities at the south side of Glen Cove Creek at the former incinerator site which was demolished in 2017. This property, which includes a waste transfer station and compost pile still in use, is being evaluated for disposition and re-use under a NYSDOS EPF grant for additional recreational uses to complement the adjacent 19-acre Macarone Stadium and add amenities including .6 miles of new public waterfront access, pathways, landscaping, parking, and signage to meet the needs of our residents. Disposition activities shall include, but not be limited to, survey work, title work, market study/research, legal fees, environmental assessments, and appraisals and other professional consultant fees. The Glen Cove Child Daycare Center Inc. (GCCDC) will be reinstating the Healthy Hearts Program which was founded in 2015. The Healthy Hearts Program was initiated to emphasize a healthy life style for the children and families of the center. To help improve the lives of these children, the Healthy Hearts Program supplies children and families with weekly and monthly programs to promote and educate families on exercise, nutrition and living a healthy lifestyle. Data from the 2018-19 program year found that 43.68% of children enrolled in the program are overweight/obese which identifies the continued need of program implementation. This is almost a 10% increase from the previous year and marks the highest percentage of overweight/obese children the program has ever had. Environmental review, site inspection/photos/measurements and improvement renderings will be acquired once funding is allocated. We find a general cost range from \$6,000.00 up to \$30,000.00 per storefront with an average at \$8,300.00 when an owner improves just signs, lights and awnings, to about \$18,500.00 when enhanced facade work is added. Through collaboration with other non-profits, community based organizations, and libraries, La Fuerza CDC has established (in addition to its main headquarters offices in East Norwich) outreach locations in areas of Nassau county that are heavily populated by Hispanics and other minorities.</p> <p>Continuous support and business education which is specific to the conditions of the targeted sectors is key to a successful program. The volume of business loans made to minority business on Long Island is very low. One of the most often quoted reason being the process involves excessive paperwork and complicated accounting requirements. For that reason, along with the Access to Capital program, the CDC provides technical support to assist the borrowers maintain proper accounting and administrative practices for sustainable growth. La Fuerza Undia CDC's pre and post loan business development services are: Basic financial literacy, business education.</p> <p>The most important focus of this program is to advocate for the rights of individuals for self-sufficiency and eliminate the risk of homelessness through job placement. Every year we introduce new components that make this proposal both a continuation and a new set of activities. The following services will be provided: Job Placement, Job Skills Training, Counseling and Advocacy. This program was established to provide a safe environment for day workers to meet prospective employers. Approximately 6,825 day workers were outreached and fill out intakes in 2018, of which 30% receive job placement with at least one day's work.</p> <p>The program is coordinated by the Job Coordinator, who is responsible for conducting worker intakes, checking income, facilitating the employer/employee matching by reaching out to prospective employers and seeking skill training opportunities. Contextualized English is offered at night three times per week. Financial and entrepreneurship and accident prevention workshops are also offered.</p> <p>This year we implemented a new initiative of a job bank operated via hotline and it has been well received. An outreach person contacts potential employers daily, fills out intakes, promotes the hiring of day workers and distributes flyers and other informational material. These potential employers could be landscaping companies, restaurants, convenience stores, supermarkets, construction and demolition companies, etc. Once a job becomes available, the business will call the organization to request a laborer and one is provided to them.</p> <p>Day workers are also approached by the job coordinator on street corners and places where the minority congregates (such as laundromats, pizza parlors). They are provided intakes and given additional information on community resources. Once their phone numbers are registered they will receive a call when a job has come up.</p> <p>This job bank alternative will work for those employers and day workers that cannot come to the program site. This is an expansion of the program seeking to further assist the most vulnerable sector of the community and provide the families necessary support.
