Members of the Planning Commission,

Let me first say that I do not envy your position. The decision to support or to oppose the largest development project in Nassau County's history — with generational consequences for our safety, the values of our homes, the air we breathe and more — is a massive responsibility. There is no doubt extreme pressure from special interest groups (the "few") working hard to drown out to voices of the millions who would be directly and negatively impacted by the Casino (the "many").

I write today in strong opposition to the development of the massive Sands casino adjacent to several vulnerable communities surrounding the "Nassau Hub". Those communities include the residential areas of Uniondale, Roosevelt and Hempstead with well documented issues of poor air quality and what I believe to be Nassau County's "Educational Hub" including Hofstra University, Nassau Community College, Kellenberg High School, Uniondale High School among others.

I think all would agree that it would be unconscionable for the Nassau County to support such a project if the majority of our local community opposes it. Based on the scoping work collected by the Town of Hempstead, 90% of our community opposes this project.

My opposition to the Sands casino rests on several points:

Sands Casino would be a horrible deal for Nassau County and the ToH. The casino of this magnitude (23,000 visitors a day / 365) undoubtedly brings incremental crime, horrific traffic and other long term negative externalities to the county (gambling addiction, drug addiction, DUIs etc). The presence of casino-related negative externalities are supported by empirical data. The only counter argument to pursuing such a project is that the "benefits outweigh the costs". For Nassau County, a thriving residential, academic and commercial community with ~3.0% unemployment, the increase in tax revenue and perhaps employment would neither stand alone as a justification for the casino, nor offset the long term increases in costs borne from the consequences of such an under-taking in terms of direct costs (public safety, infrastructure) and longer term implications (services to treat drug, alcohol, gambling addition, etc)

Sands will take from the (mostly) poor, pay taxes (mostly) to New York State and leave the majority of the baggage (pollution, DUIs, gambling addition impacting our friends and family members etc) on our nearby communities.

Proposed site in Nassau county is an irresponsible and predatory location for a casino. Hofstra University, Nassau Community College, Kellenberg, Uniondale High Schools all

stand in close proximity to the proposed Casino site. This area of Nassau County is literally where we allow our children and young people to learn and grow and yet the highest risk for gambling addiction is young people ages 18-24.

How could we expose the most easily influenced segments of our population to such a negative influence? Is this the definition of "investing in our future" that our elected officials want to be associated with as they seek reelection in future years? Additionally, it has been documented that the poorest air quality in the county sits in surrounding areas to the proposed Casino site including areas such as Uniondale and Roosevelt. It is predatory to expose these lower income communities to the impacts of further degraded air quality.

Allowing Sands to build their predatory Casino in the Nassau Hub would be a horrible deal for now and for the future of Nassau County.

Before you vote on this lease agreement, I request each of the members to ask themselves some very important questions.

- 1) The Sands casino plans to take in more than \$2 billion a year in gambling losses. That is \$2 billion dollars that will no longer be spent in our local restaurants and downtowns. Have you considered the negative implications to our local businesses from this massive diversion of discretionary dollars?
- 2) Have you read the Spectrum Consulting report that NYS had prepared to assess the economic impact of opening three new casinos? The report concluded that \$1.7 billion of gambling losses would come from "latent demand". Though the lease at hand is "only" for LV Sands ("LVS") to control and operate the Nassau Coliseum, it's clearly intended to reinforce LVS's position to apply for a casino license. It's in that context that I am writing to you.

As our Planning Commission, Nassau County residents rely on you for your expertise and vision to ensure that publicly-owned property is put to its best use and highest purpose. If Planning Commission members were asked years ago whether "highest purpose" included the country's second-largest casino, I doubt that any of you would have agreed.

The Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum is surrounded by reasons why a casino doesn't belong there: A university, a community college, a cancer treatment center, a densely populated suburban neighborhood, a nature preserve, a beautiful county park, and a museum row catering to children and families surround this space. A high school is also a short walk away. A huge hospital is being planned for the adjacent property. Each of these adjoining entities on their own is reason enough that an establishment that glorifies gambling is wholly inappropriate for that space.

Furthermore, I am opposed to giving this lease to LVS for the following reasons:

- 1. Why does the lease give LVS the right to control the property for 42 years but LVS can cancel the lease whenever they want? No lease agreement ever gives one party a unilateral right to cancel a lease agreement.
- 2. What does the phrase "Transition Payments" mean? Doesn't this phrase tell you that this lease is meant to "transition" to another lease where Sands can operate a massive casino?
- 3. The objective of this lease is to help LVS win a casino license since LVS could claim to the Location Board that they control the property. If the Planning Commission approves this lease, the Commission would be aiding and abetting LVS in winning a casino license. Nassau County should not be assisting any corporation in winning a casino license especially given that the environmental impact study is nowhere near completion.

Casino operations have a history of underperforming financially as reported by our NY State Comptroller. Just this month, the New York Post editorial board

recommended strongly against <u>any</u> new casinos being built in the state since they are known to be financial and social burdens to their communities. In their words, new casino licenses are "among the worst ideas yet to come from our legislative overlords".

I am writing to you as a concerned resident of the Town of Hempstead and Nassau County regarding the initiative to place a Casino in the vicinity of the Nassau Hub next to Hofstra University. <u>I am</u> adamantly opposed to:1) the proposed agreement to lease the Coliseum to Las Vegas Sands; and 2) having a Casino built in the vicinity of the Coliseum or anywhere in Nassau County. The proposed Coliseum Lease appears to be a blatant attempt to circumvent our environmental laws by improperly segmenting the lease agreement into 2 Contracts.

You have already been inundated with the obvious reasons for not wanting the Casino (crime, drugs, congestion, etc.). I also feel these reasons are extremely important, especially the negative of having 23,000 new people per day draw from the Long Island Aquifer. That will have a huge negative impact to the quality of life and future of Long Island. There have been numerous articles in the NY Times over the last 6 months about industries drawing more from the aquifers than mother nature is able to put into the aquifer and the impending problem that will create to the population. What will you do when you flush your toilet or turn on the water to make a meal, wash your hands or take a shower and there is insufficient water & pressure to deliver that valuable resource? Are you going to call a plumber to fix the problem. **You can't fix a depleted gauifer.**

Who is going to pay for Fire Protection? I don't believe any of the Fire Departments in the Town of Hempstead are trained to fight a fire of the magnitude that could occur in the size (ie., height) of the proposed Casino. That is a recipe for a disaster. Are you going to tax residents who have nothing to do with the Casino for the cost of that coverage? That is not a viable solution.

Why do you think the Casino Companies want to export gambling out of Las Vegas? All you have to do is go to the NY Times Business Section, Tuesday, February 6, 2024 for the answer. I've attached a PDF of the Articles for your reading enjoyment. Nevada wants to diversify itself away from the Gaming Industry because of the disastrous results that occur when you have thousands of people out of work due to an economic downturn. Who pays for that? Not only do we then have a Casino that sucks the \$\$ out of Nassau County but we now as taxpayers have to foot the bill for the social services that would be required to help address the problem. That does not sound like a sound investment in the future of Nassau County or Long Island. Having already experienced several economic downturns and the negative impact on Gaming Industry employees, Nevada is investing in industries that provide higher paying jobs than the service industries and jobs that have a mission and opportunities for advancement with the propensity of creating new skills that a gaming service industry is unable to do. I am writing to express my opposition to a lease agreement being granted to Las Vegas Sands. It is apparent that their end goal is to build a resort complex with a casino on the property currently occupied by the Nassau Coliseum. The result of building a mega complex of that magnitude at the Coliseum site would have an immediate detrimental effect on the Quality of Life and Health of the residents in the immediate surrounding communities as well as communities throughout Nassau County.

Nassau County is plagued by gridlock traffic daily due to our inadequate road network and lack of alternate roads and routes for vehicles to travel. As a Uniondale resident I experience daily gridlock near the Nassau Coliseum site as well as throughout Nassau County on my daily commute. Not to mention the closest highway to the Nassau Coliseum is the Meadowbrook Parkway which prohibits commercial vehicles. Reports show that Nassau County's groundwater aquifers are running dangerously low as the County's increased development has led to our aquifers becoming overburdened. My main question has always been; How does building a mega complex of that magnitude and adding a projected 30,000 vehicles daily mitigate our air pollution, traffic, water, waste, and most importantly our high asthma and respiratory issues plaguing our communities?

The Sierra Club's Long Island Group opposes the construction of this casino in Nassau County due to its significant and negative effects upon our local environment and quality of life. Consequently we believe this proposed lease agreement should not be approved. The following is our position paper on the Sands casino issue.

On October 24, 2013, a New York Times editorial warned of the long-term negative effects casinos have on their surrounding area and the local economy. Ten years later, studies by The Illinois Law Review1 and other interest groups indicate no better prognosis regarding the presence of a casino in a residential community.

The Long Island Sierra Club has strong concerns about the environmental impacts. Nassau County and Las Vegas Sands (LVS) should have taken more time to do a thorough and independent environmental assessment. Fortunately, the NYS Supreme Court, on November 9th, made the same determination.

Environmental concerns and questions raised by residents and environmentalists across Nassau and Suffolk Counties include:

Noise, light, particulate and chemical pollution from the casino and services to the casino disrupting the natural environment and negatively impacting the quality of life for residents.

Covering the ground with an excessive amount of impermeable surfaces such as roofs and paving will affect groundwater 2. The casino will be 3.8 million square feet, the equivalent of 1.65 Roosevelt Fields and parking will be needed for 12,000 or more vehicles, a high number because there is little public transportation to this location. Large amounts of garbage will be generated at a time when most landfills must soon close. Where will the garbage go, how will it get there, and at what environmental and economic cost to the Towns (or off island locations) that accept it?

Road congestion – pollution (CO2 output, tailpipe oil/gas releases) and increased accident rates and accident-related pollution.

Water waste volume will be high. It should be treated on site and recharge the groundwater but will instead be transported offsite and sent to sea.

The electric energy demand will be very high. This comes at a time when there have been more heat breaking days than ever with 2023 being the warmest year on record. Almost all our electricity is created by burning something, and burning creates more heat than any other means of generating electricity. Unless and until we have non-heat creating electricity generation, a casino does not make sense.

The land was not zoned for this type of use, nor should it be. The land is one of the few places where the vast plains of Long Island still exist. As such, they are a refuge for many animal and plant species and could be developed as a tourist attraction. The casino will be in the Town of Hempstead which is already exceeding the state recommended water withdrawal limits set back in the mid-1900's. That is why the casino will need its own water well. But drawing the large amount of water the casino will need from the aquifer will affect the drinking water south of the casino.3

The Sierra Club agrees with the growing number of residents, as well as the courts, who are demanding that the process slow down and allow for an independent Environmental Review of the LVS proposal. The Sierra Club supports the effort to preserve the balance of nature and responsible growth on Long Island.

- 1 Included in the website, <u>www.stoppredatorygambling.org</u> are several papers issued by the prestigious Illinois Law Review. The best summary of gambling issues, according to National Director, Les Bernal, is a University of Illinois Law Review Volume 2021 Number 5 titled: "Bans on Sports Gambling and Lotteries Would Pump-Prime the U.S. Economic System In The New Age Of Covid".
- 2 Covering the ground with impermeable materials prevents rain water from entering the ground below those surfaces. In heavy rains, that water will run off instead of replenishing the underground water supply. The immediate effect will be to flood surrounding lands and roads. The long-term effect will be for streams and ponds to run dry and people to have more water restriction days. Dry wells would increase the amount of water entering the ground but would also increase the amount of poison carried with it. Normally, water entering from the surface is cleaned by surface plants, bacteria, and microbes before it gets into the ground water. Sewered drains would not help with water recharge. Sewers carry water to a treatment plant then out to sea.

From the report <u>Groundwater Sustainability - Long Island, New York | U.S. Geological Survey (usgs.gov)</u> (a.k.a. https://www.usgs.gov/centers/new-york-water-science-center/science/groundwater-sustainability-long-island-new-york#overview)

- "... if the water table is lowered (or depth to water is increased) from pumping or sewering, streams and other water bodies can be adversely impacted. In western parts on Long Island, many steams and water bodies have already seen declines in groundwater discharge over the past decades, which is attributed to increased sewering and groundwater withdrawal (<u>Busciolano, 2005</u>). These declines have caused reduced streamflow and lake levels, and have affected the overall health of these water bodies."
- 3 From a NY Times investigation (August 28, 2023) on groundwater across America:

"Overpumping can have other risks beyond diminishing the supply of water. It can also contaminate aquifers in ways that make the remaining water unsafe or undrinkable.

For example, in coastal areas, overpumping can accelerate "saltwater intrusion," the

movement of ocean water into the freshwater aquifer, making it first unappetizing, then unhealthy.

Saltwater intrusion is happening in the Northeast, the mid-Atlantic states, Florida, the Gulf Coast and California. "It's pretty widespread," said Dr. Cline of the U.S. Geological Survey.

Consider Long Island in New York. Saltwater is encroaching on parts of the aquifers that provide drinking water for the three million people who live east of Queens and Brooklyn. The Suffolk County Water Authority has had to limit pumping at about 60 of its wells, or 10 percent of the total, according to Dan Dubois, a spokesman."

Salt water intrusion happens when the pressure from fresh water running underground from the land decreases allowing the higher-pressure sea water to "backup" into the fresh water basins (aquifers). Its most recognizable along the coasts. This happens when too little rain gets into the ground, the result of too many impermeable surfaces covering the ground such as rooftops and paved parking lots and the water runs off instead of penetrating the ground. It is made worse by road drains that transfer water run-off from the hardened grounds to a waste water treatment plant. Communities to the south of the proposed casino are already dealing with this.

Casinos are a dying business in 2024. Their operators are desperate for new sources of income.

Fourteen months after Las Vegas Sands presented their proposal in April 2023 to the general public, we know much more thanks to emerging studies we did not have available to us.

You get a chance to reconsider last year's vote, armed with

better information and with the benefit of time to review it.

Gambling was prohibited in NY State until 2013. Governor Andrew Cuomo was looking for more tax revenue to spend. In 2011 and 2012, gambling interests spent \$17.8 million on lobbying and political contributions. In November, 2011, the Governor quietly changed the wording of the ballot measure to read more like an ad, as follows:

"The proposed amendment to section 9 of article 1 of the Constitution is to allow the Legislature to authorize up to seven casinos in New York State for the legislated purposes of promoting job growth, increasing aid to schools, and permitting local governments to lower property taxes through revenues generated. Shall the amendment be approved?"

We were all duped by this wording as some type of responsible fiscal management. All these promises to promote job growth, lower property taxes, and increase aid to schools fell short of projections and wound-up costing NY State more than we earned in so-called "revenues". The revenues are gambling losses.

Since April 2023, we have learned Casinos have financially underperformed while bringing crime, gambling addiction, and pollution to each locale.

One year after casinos were legalized in NY, a July 13, 2014 NY Times editorial warned us that research indicates "just when New York is proposing to ramp up its gambling business, the financial community (Moody's Investment Services) is souring on the idea that casinos are an easy answer to state and local financial problems."

The 2014 editorial also stated: "New York's comptroller, Thomas DiNapoli, warned that the job and economic gains in communities where new casinos are built "may be offset by losses elsewhere."

Emerging research in recent years confirms that gambling, lotteries, and sports betting actually remove revenue from local economies.

• In 2021, The University of Illinois Law Review published a 23-page report by Prof. Em. John Warren Kindt titled:

"Bans on Sports Gambling and Lotteries would pump-prime the U.S. Economic System in the new age of Covid".

In it he quotes Nobel-Prize Laureate Paul Samuelson who emphasized that gambling creates "no new money or goods" and "subtracts from the national income."

• In May 2023, the National Center for Suburban Studies at Hofstra University published "a vision for long-term

growth' which helped provide answers to questions regarding development at the Hub. The title of the paper is "The Economic Unsuitability of a Casino at the Nassau County Hub'.

In it, they propose alternate projects similar to those which you, the Legislature, have already welcomed. For example, the announcement by NYU/Langone and Nassau Community College to coordinate on the establishment of a medical center at the Hub. Importantly, it would not diminish the important presence of Winthrop Hospital (NYU/Langone) in Mineola.

Many have said 'the Nassau County Hub is a wasted, non-income-producing parking lot'. The proposed medical center seems the perfect answer to what we have been asking for; something our aging society needs, including better paying jobs for our local residents. Casinos are notorious for low paying, and low morale jobs.

Please re-think your vote as we do not need a casino in one of the wealthiest and one of the most peaceful counties in the nation.

You will need plentiful parking for this new NYU/Langone medical facility, which will enhance our quality of life. A casino does not improve quality of life. Property values surrounding a casino diminish according to the National Association of Realtors. At the same time, crime rises. In fact,

LV Sands has volunteered to set up an extra police station on site! Foreclosures also rise in the towns surrounding a casino as problem gambling and gambling addiction sets in.

The Hub is the perfect place to move forward with the NYU/Langone and NCC proposal. In this modern age, there are now mini-Forests being erected to help cool our planet in ways a casino cannot. Please look up SUGi Project. Such plantings would help cool The Hub and effectively complement any responsible new construction at The Hub.

LV Sands wants to erect the nation's second largest casino in a year which will be the hottest on record. Each of the last twelve months have set a heat record for the month across America. Las Vegas Sands will have to run air conditioning, lighting, and some retails space 24/7/365 while drawing so much water (875,000 gallons a day) that they have to request re-zoning, then build a new well AND figure out where to move all the waste on top of our fragile aquifer.

A mini forest need not be trees. We can extend our beautiful Hempstead Plains, which is right next to The Hub, if environmental experts determine this is a better way forward in this Climate Crisis. Either plan will help cool the spaces between the proposed medical facility and the coliseum and the Marriott. This would be responsible growth, keeping the areas surrounding Hofstra and NCC, Memorial Sloan-Kettering, and Nassau Coliseum, a more attractive and vibrant Hub.

 On February 22, 2024, NY State Senator, Liz Krueger, hosted a Town Hall in New York City titled "The Impact of Casinos on Urban Communities" featuring Les Bernal, National Director of Stop Predatory Gambling, and Lucy Dadayan, Principal Research Associate with the Urban-Brookings Tax Policy Center at the Urban Institute.

Mr. Bernal reminds us 'the house always wins'. He further notes that corporate gambling is the only business we are aware of where the owners have an adversarial relationship with their customers. Casinos and online gambling interests target their future "VIPs" in the pursuit of gamblers willing to keep trying to win back their losses. Sadly, this translates to the development and nurturing of problem gamblers or worse, gambling addicts.

This is why LV Sands is spending so much money in advance to work their way in. To pay their way in. Why would we invite this into our peaceful County? We were all raised and counseled DO NOT take candy, ice cream, or money from strangers. Why would we accept all the riches up front which LV Sands is offering? They are overly generous. Why?

In the same Town Hall, Ms. Dadayan presented years of study (including 2019-2023) confirming what we suspected: 'the presence of a casino generally costs the local economy more than it gains'. One study by Baylor University professor Earl

Grinois found casinos create \$3 in social costs for every \$1 they bring in.

Why is that? If they bring in so much revenue, how can we lose? The reason is that the "revenue" should more accurately be labeled "losses". The \$2 billion in profit to the casino operator, which Las Vegas Sands is projecting at the Nassau County Hub, will largely be monies taken out of the wallets of neighbors and friends. Mostly from their targeted audience: young people (college-age students), the less fortunate who are trying to make ends meet despite the odds (generally, people of color), and the lonely (senior citizens and lonely people hooked to their phones).

All any casino needs are a few newly addicted gamblers each week to keep the money rolling in. These losses, or "revenue' as Casinos prefer to label it, could instead have been rent money, food money, tuition money, local restaurant and museum money. The local economy loses out; as do families directly affected by the emerging gambling addiction crisis.

Please appreciate the \$2 billion figure is a sales person's projection.

Ms. Dadayan's research supports what the NY Times editorial feared. And what the NY State Comptroller noted. Ms. Dadayan reports "gambling revenue decline is everywhere, even in Nevada. In Philadelphia, Boston, and Chicago, all are

falling short of income forecasts. New York has seen a revenue decline of 10-25% since 2019".

She added:

- National figures show negative growth
- In NY State, Resorts World income is down 23% since 2019
- Revenues are volatile and decrease over time.
- They won't fund critical services. This is especially important as Governor Hochul is relying on casinos to fund the MTA. They cannot.
- FBI statistics show non-violent crime increases, and Nevada is the capital of human sex trafficking

Ms. Dadayan concluded her presentation, noting Casino revenues are ALWAYS over-estimated", and "casinos offer low-skilled jobs which hinder economic growth.

Utah was named this year, by the U.S. News & World Report, the nation's healthiest State economy. While many factors led to this rating, it is notable that Utah prohibits gambling.

You likely did not have much of this information when the Legislature voted 17-1-1 in favor of moving forward with the Las Vegas Sands Casino proposal. Now the evidence is irrefutable, and gambling addiction is on the rise. With on-line gambling also on the rise, gambling in a brick-and-mortar casino becomes less convenient, and less desirable a destination. They will not get the projected 23,000 visitors per

day. They might for six months. Then what?

We'll be stuck with a smaller version of Atlantic City. An empty promise; we'll be stuck with the eyesore of Nassau County's two tallest towers, largely empty as yet another casino falls short, looming over our local universities. The facts are now evident.

Fortunately, we have all been gifted with a do-over.

Please say "NO" to a casino and allow the excellent alternative of a new medical facility with surrounding green spaces. This will allow us all to thrive as the planet heats up.

It is socially, economically, and environmentally irresponsible to allow two 26-story towers and a massive casino floor to be dumped in the middle of our peaceful and thriving County.

Vote "no" this second time around. The age of casinos has passed. They are a dying business we cannot afford to support.

A guestion that should be on most residents' minds soon will be the one related to the building of a gambling casino on the site of the Nassau Coliseum in Uniondale. The issue is whether a casino is or is not wanted and whether will it be beneficial to the local communities. involved. I would like to provide a little background and insight on modern casinos in that most are made up of computerized gambling machines and only some have table games. A casino themselves carefully set up their layouts so that their computerized gambling machines are located near the casino's entrance and some pay out more frequently so that passers by are enticed by all the flashing lights and bells to draw them into their establishment. A typical casino gambler sits at a computer screen, slides their credit card into the machine, and immediately enters a digital environment carefully constructed to keep them playing until all available money is gone. Casinos are built with no windows and no clocks in order that players prolong their stays at the machines or the tables, a phenomenon that the industry calls "playing to extinction."

In the past casinos were allowed in Atlantic City back in 1997 while advocates promised that gambling would revive the town's fading economy. The casinos did create jobs as promised but merchants in the area were sorely disappointed with the outcome. The money that comes to the casinos, stays in the casinos. The only thriving businesses in the area were liquor stores, cash-for-gold outlets, and pawn shops that took over the city's once primary retail shopping strip. The impact of casinos on local property values according to the National Association of Realtors was clearly negative. Casinos did not revive local economies but acted as parasites upon them. They reported that local communities within 10 miles of the casino exhibited double the rate of problem gambling. Not surprisingly these communities also suffered higher rates

of home foreclosures and other forms of economic distress along with an increase in domestic violence. Are we really looking forward to all this? **JUST SAY NO** to the Nassau Casino.

I am writing to you as a concerned resident of the Town of Hempstead and Nassau County regarding the initiative to place a Casino in the vicinity of the Nassau Hub next to Hofstra University. Lam adamantly opposed to: 1) the proposed lease of the Coliseum to Las Vegas Sands; and 2) having a Casino built there or anywhere in Nassau County. The proposed lease agreement is a blatant attempt to circumvent our environmental laws by improperly segmenting the lease agreement with Sands into 2 contracts.

You have already been inundated with the obvious reasons for not wanting the Casino (crime, drugs, congestion, etc.). I also feel these reasons are extremely important, especially the negative of having 23,000 new people per day draw from the Long Island Aquifer. That will have a huge negative impact to the quality of life and future of Long Island. There have been numerous articles in the NY Times over the last 6 months about industries drawing more from the aquifers than mother nature is able to put into the aquifer and the impending problem that will create to the population. What will you do when you flush your toilet or turn on the water to make a meal, wash your hands or take a shower and there is insufficient water & pressure to deliver that valuable resource? Are you going to call a plumber to fix the problem. **You can't fix a depleted aquifer.**

Who is going to pay for Fire Protection? I don't believe any of the Fire Departments in the Town of Hempstead are trained to fight a fire of the magnitude that could occur in the size (ie., height) of the proposed Casino. That is a recipe for a disaster. Are you going to tax residents who have nothing to do with the Casino for the cost of that coverage? That is not a viable solution.

Why do you think the Casino Companies want to export gambling out of Las Vegas? All you have to do is go to the NY Times Business Section, Tuesday, February 6, 2024 for the answer. I've attached a PDF of the Articles for your reading enjoyment. Nevada wants to diversify itself away from the Gaming Industry because of the disastrous results that occur when you have thousands of people out of work due to an economic downturn. Who pays for that? Not only do we then have a Casino that sucks the \$\$ out of Nassau County but we now as taxpayers have to foot the bill for the social services that would be required to help address the problem. That does not sound like a sound investment in the future of Nassau County or Long Island. 

No amount of word-smithing can change the character of what Bruce Blakeman and the Las Vegas Sands are attempting to do at the Nassau Coliseum. The proposed Mitchell Field Integrated Resort District will be 1.5 times larger than Roosevelt Field and at the heart of this project is a 400,000 square foot Las Vegas style gambling casino. This gambling space is equivalent to that of the largest casino in the world – Winstar World Casino in Thackerville, Oklahoma. The population of Thackerville was 178 people per square mile as of the 2020 census while the population of Nassau County was 4,905.3 people per square mile as per the same census. Maybe Thackerville can handle that type of traffic but I am sure that Hempstead Tpke and Meadowbrook Parkway cannot. As any Long Islander knows, these roadways are congested enough during rush hour, holiday shopping time, and on summer beach days and to add the projected 23,000 cars per day on our roads and parkways is incredulous and will not only affect immediate towns and villages surrounding the Hub but all of Nassau County and Long Island.

Members of the Planning Commission,

Let me first say that I do not envy your position. The decision to support or to oppose the largest development project in Nassau County's history — with generational consequences for our safety, the values of our homes, the air we breathe and more — is a massive responsibility. There is no doubt extreme pressure from special interest groups (the "few") working hard to drown out to voices of the millions who would be directly and negatively impacted by the Casino (the "many").

I write today in strong opposition to the development of the massive Sands casino adjacent to several vulnerable communities surrounding the "Nassau Hub". Those communities include the residential areas of Uniondale, Roosevelt and Hempstead with well documented issues of poor air quality and what I believe to be Nassau County's "Educational Hub" including Hofstra University, Nassau Community College, Kellenberg High School, Uniondale High School among others.

I think all would agree that it would be unconscionable for the Nassau County to support such a project if the majority of our local community opposes it. Based on the scoping work collected by the Town of Hempstead, 90% of our community opposes this project.

My opposition to the Sands casino rests on several points:

Sands Casino would be a horrible deal for Nassau County and the ToH. The casino of this magnitude (23,000 visitors a day / 365) undoubtedly brings incremental crime, horrific traffic and other long term negative externalities to the county (gambling addiction, drug addiction, DUIs etc). The presence of casino-related negative externalities are supported by empirical data. The only counter argument to pursuing such a project is that the "benefits outweigh the costs". For Nassau County, a thriving residential, academic and commercial community with ~3.0% unemployment, the increase in tax revenue and perhaps employment would neither stand alone as a justification for the casino, nor offset the long term increases in costs borne from the consequences of such an under-taking in terms of direct costs (public safety, infrastructure) and longer term implications (services to treat drug, alcohol, gambling addition, etc)

Sands will take from the (mostly) poor, pay taxes (mostly) to New York State and leave the majority of the baggage (pollution, DUIs, gambling addition impacting our friends and family members etc) on our nearby communities.

<u>Proposed site in Nassau county is an irresponsible and predatory location for a casino</u>. Hofstra University, Nassau Community College, Kellenberg, Uniondale High Schools all stand in close proximity to the proposed Casino site. This area of Nassau County is literally where we allow our children and young people to learn and grow and yet the highest risk for gambling addiction is young people ages 18-24.

How could we expose the most easily influenced segments of our population to such a negative influence? Is this the definition of "investing in our future" that our elected officials want to be associated with as they seek reelection in future years? Additionally, it has been documented

that the poorest air quality in the county sits in surrounding areas to the proposed Casino site including areas such as Uniondale and Roosevelt. It is predatory to expose these lower income communities to the impacts of further degraded air quality.

Allowing Sands to build their predatory Casino in the Nassau Hub would be a horrible deal for now and for the future of Nassau County.

The "many" (in fact about 90%) do not want this Casino — allowing the "few" to impose such a negative project on our homes, health, our wallets, way of life is nothing short of tyranny.

I am a lifelong resident of Garden City and I write to you to advise I am adamantly opposed to the Sands Casino proposed development being considered for the Nassau Coliseum property.

I implore you to vote NO to Casino.

My reasons for opposing a Casino at this is location, are not new, and have been well stated before by many, but to reiterate a few:

1. TRAFFIC NIGHTMARE: It will have a horrendous effect

On Traffic which will erode our quality of life, especially in the surrounding neighborhoods which are already experiencing traffic jams and backups. Nassau County is already heavily congested with traffic each and every day - with Roosevelt Field nearby, the Meadowbrook Parkway and surrounding roads will be packed. My name is Terry Coniglio and I am here as spokesperson for Hofstra University.

We appreciate and support the County's facilitating the continuing operation of the Coliseum to host events – in the same manner as has been occurring – until a resolution is later reached regarding the long-term development of the Coliseum site.

The proposed lease with Las Vegas Sands, on its face, does more than that and constitutes a first step toward letting Las Vegas Sands develop a casino. We know Sands' intentions, and they were made clear by the Planning Commission's notice for this hearing, which stated that the proposed lease is part of Las Vegas Sands' effort to develop a casino. This future development and use of the property is the specific goal pursued by Las Vegas Sands. Moreover, there is no evidence that Las Vegas Sands' business model includes running anything aside from casinos.

Let's be clear. If the proposed lease was just about operating the Coliseum in its current state, then several of the terms of the proposed lease would be different.

For example, the 42-year-term of the proposed lease is inconsistent with simply continuing regular operations of the Coliseum. This term is an effort to foreclose the possibility of any long-term development of the Coliseum by anyone other than Las Vegas Sands.

Likewise, rent of ten million dollars per year is excessive for simply running the Coliseum in its current state. Instead, this amount reflects the substantial value to Las Vegas Sands of having control over this county property for its proposed casino development.

If this were just about operating the Coliseum, then other operators would have been considered. The County informed OSPAC on Tuesday that no other operators were considered. This proposed lease provides advantages to Las Vegas Sands for it to develop its casino, one of which is that Las Vegas Sands' control of the property allows them to promote its proposed casino development on county property.

For these reasons, Hofstra University believes this body– when considering the proposed lease at this time – should take into account the risks and harms posed by the casino development.


We have submitted written testimony that provides more information regarding our ongoing concerns with the proposed casino development, including issues of traffic, crime, pollution, water quality, and so forth. We will provide additional testimony and comments about these issues at future hearings when this Commission and the County consider the Las Vegas Sands' specific plans for a casino development at the Nassau Hub. Thank you.

I'm a partner in Rivkin Radler, LLP, attorneys for Hofstra University. I submit this letter as comments to the Planning Commission's review of the proposed Lease Agreement between Nassau County and LVS NY HOLDCO 2, LLC (hereinafter referred to as "Sands") for the operation of the Nassau County Coliseum. This letter supplements the written comments previously submitted by Hofstra to the Planning Commission.

The terms of the proposed Lease Agreement demonstrate it is a part of Sands application to develop the Coliseum site, including with a casino. The proposed 42 year Lease Agreement allows Sands to cancel on thirty (30) days notice. The proposed Lease Agreement contains several other provisions that show that the proposed lease is a precursor to, and clearly contemplates, the development. These provisions include a broad use clause that references any entertainment purpose, which could include a casino; permitting Severance Leases which may include a casino use; the characterization of a "transition" term; and Sands' ability to close the Coliseum after three years.

Under New York law, when undertaking SEQRA review, it is improper to segment portions of a project in order to avoid complete review of the environmental impacts of a proposed action. See <u>J. Owens Bldg. Co., Inc. v. Town of Clarkstown</u>, 128 A.D.3d 1067, 10 N.Y.S.3d 293 (2d Dep't 2015) (improper segmentation when only a stage or activity is reviewed instead the full intended project); see also <u>Defreestville Area Neighborhood Ass'n Inc. v. Town Board of North Greenbush</u>, 299 A.D.2d 631, 750 N.Y.S.2d 164 (3d Dep't 2002). In fact, Nassau County was already determined to have engaged in improper segmentation when it failed to do a full SEQRA review when entering into the now void lease that would have permitted a casino. See Decision and Order dated November 9, 2023 in <u>Hofstra University v. Nassau County Planning Commission</u>, Index No. 606293/2023, Supreme Court, Nassau County, Hon. Sarika Kapoor, Justice (citing <u>Matter of Evans v. City of Saratoga Springs</u>, 202 A.D.3d 1318, 164 N.Y.S.3d 227 [3d Dep't 2022]).

Here, Nassau County and Sands have flatly and publicly admitted that it is their intention to proceed with the proposed development of the Coliseum site, including a casino. The proposed Lease Agreement is the first step in this overall development. There is no other reason that Sands has an interest in running the Coliseum than to be in a position to begin the process of bidding for a casino license from New York State.

Accordingly, the review of the proposed Lease Agreement should not be segmented to just the operation of the Coliseum, but should include the proposed full development of the property as is sought by Sands.

To Whom It May Concern:

We, the representatives of the Incorporated Village of Garden City ("The Village"), write to provide comments and strongly oppose OSPAC 2-2024 Resolution and the proposed lease for a portion of the Nassau Coliseum site between Nassau County and LV NY HOLDCO 2, LLC ("Sands"). Our opposition is based on significant concerns regarding the unlawful segmentation of the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") process and flaws in the existing environmental review.

1. Unlawful Segmentation of SEQRA Review

The lease agreement between Nassau County and Sands is intrinsically linked to the broader casino project. Throughout the review process, Sands has consistently stated that securing this lease is essential for advancing their casino project. By separating the lease approval from the overall project review, the environmental impacts are not being fully considered. This piecemeal approach obscures the true scope of the environmental, social, and economic impacts, and such consideration constitutes unlawful segmentation. A bedrock principle of SEQRA is that the lead agency should consider the environmental impacts of the "whole action" before approving, funding, or undertaking any specific element of the action. 6 N.Y.C.R.R. § 617.3(g). Assessing only part of a complete action is considered improper "segmentation" of the environmental review process.

Considering the lease independently from the casino project undermines the integrity of the SEQRA process and puts our community at risk. This attempt to minimize scrutiny and circumvent comprehensive environmental review process is unlawful and cannot be permitted. Obtaining site control is one phase of the overall action of operation and development of the site. Approval of this lease at this stage prevents a full assessment of the project's cumulative impacts.

Impermissible segmentation is well-defined in legal precedents and regulatory frameworks, with the exceptions being clear. Segmentation is only allowed if the agency clearly states its reasons and demonstrates that the segmented review is equally protective of the environment. In this case, no such justification has been provided by Nassau County, nor is it possible to segment this review without compromising environmental protection.

2. Environmental Review Deficiencies

Given that the lease is inextricably tied to the overall environmental review of the casino project, we feel compelled to reiterate the concerns we outlined in our February 19, 2024 letter. In that public comment we highlighted several substantial flaws in the Draft Scope for the Environmental Impact Statement ("EIS") for the Sands New York Integrated Resort Project. To date, these flaws have yet to be adequately addressed. Below we expand upon our previous comments as the Planning Commission considers a lease that will inevitably contribute to the casino project moving forward.

Natural Resources Impact

Consideration of this lease must involve a comprehensive analysis of the potential impacts on natural resources, particularly the Hempstead Plains. This area, historically significant and ecologically sensitive, houses several rare species. There must be detailed assessments to ensure the preservation of these species and their habitats. Any disturbance to this delicate ecosystem could have irreversible consequences.

Water and Sewage Systems

The proposed development significantly underestimates the strain on the Village's water supply systems. An exhaustive and independent hydrological analysis is essential to ascertain the project's true demand and its repercussions on the water resources of neighboring communities, including Garden City. Before consideration of the lease, there must be discussion of candidate sites for the proposed new water supply well and analyze capacity concerns and potential water quality degradation due to groundwater withdrawal.

Moreover, the capacity of the Cedar Creek Water Pollution Control Plant to handle the increased nutrient load from the development has not been sufficiently addressed. This plant is already under pressure, and environmental review must include comprehensive studies on the plant's ability to manage additional wastewater without compromising water quality.

Traffic and Infrastructure Stress

The anticipated surge in traffic congestion necessitates a far more detailed investigation to develop solutions that may mitigate the impending strain on the Village's local infrastructure and emergency services. The existing documentation fails to assess a study area representative of the

full scope of the development's reach. The study area must be expanded to sufficiently prove that no significant adverse impacts will occur at the outermost intersections of the Village. Without understanding the full potential for adverse impacts, the traffic study cannot adequately identify the necessary mitigation measures.

Socio-Economic and Community Impact

The existing reviews do not fully capture the socio-economic detriments of the proposed project. A thorough socio-economic impact study, incorporating detailed analyses of the impacts of casinos on similarly situated communities, should be conducted. The scope must establish the requisite metrics and thresholds necessary to quantify the full spectrum of impacts on community character, aesthetic and visual resources, secondary displacement, crime, and addiction.

Given the proximity of this development to educational institutions, there is a pressing need to meticulously evaluate the potential risks this development poses to students. The presence of a casino and associated facilities near colleges and schools raises concerns about the vulnerability of young individuals to gambling and its associated societal issues. A comprehensive study is necessary to fully understand these risks before proceeding with the development.

In light of the above, the Village of Garden City demands a halt to the lease agreement with LVS NY Holdco 2, LLC until a comprehensive, unsegmented SEQRA review is conducted. This review must account for all phases of the proposed casino project and its cumulative impacts on the environment, community character, and socio-economic conditions.

We urge the Nassau County Planning Commission to fulfill its commitment to protecting community and natural resources from the potentially devastating impacts of this project by ensuring that the environmental review process strictly adheres to SEORA requirements.

To Whom It May Concern:

We, the representatives of the Incorporated Village of Garden City ("The Village") write to provide comments on the Draft Scope and Full Environmental Assessment Form ("FEAF") submitted by LVS NY Holdco 2 (the "Applicant" or "Sands") for its proposed development of the Sands New York Integrated Resort ("Integrated Resort") at the Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum site ("Coliseum"). The Town of Hempstead Department of Planning and Economic Development should reject Sands' request for rezoning, and the application of a new zoning district to the property at the Coliseum, 1255 Hempstead Turnpike, Uniondale, as well as the neighboring Marriott Hotel site at 1010 James Doolittle Boulevard, Uniondale. The proposed Integrated Resort at the Coliseum site aims to transform the area into a multifaceted entertainment complex including everything from a casino to retail spaces. This expansion, however, will have catastrophic impacts on neighboring communities, including the Village of Garden City.

After thorough review, we have identified the deficiencies detailed below. The Village is greatly concerned that the Draft Scope is devoid of complete analysis in several key areas of concern. Specifically, the Draft Scope does not adequately address the impacts on natural resources, particularly the Hempstead Plains; does not provide sufficient detail as to how the Environmental Impact Statement ("EIS") will assess and mitigate the potential impacts to existing water and sewage systems; and does not sufficiently address the very significant impacts to community character in the immediate vicinity of the Site, as well as surrounding neighborhoods, such as the Village of Garden City. Moreover, the scope of the traffic impacts study outlined in the Draft Scope is grossly deficient. Importantly, all projects that affect the study area (i.e. Nassau Community College expansions and alterations at Roosevelt Field) must be considered cumulatively with the casino's analysis. Our critique, supported by the enclosed expert technical review of PVE, LLC, identifies many substantive inadequacies, including, but not limited to the following:

1. Failure to Consider Alternatives

The FEAF acknowledges that the full redevelopment of the Marriott parcel would result in the "increased magnitude of the overall proposed action and associated impacts." However, the scoping document omits any evaluation of the redevelopment. The final scoping document must clearly delineate the intended plans for the Mariott property and how it will be analyzed in the EIS.

Furthermore, the Draft Scope fails to provide any explanation regarding the development that would be pursued should the gaming license not be granted (including which, if any, of the promised payments and benefits would be realized). This alternative must be fully detailed and analyzed in the EIS, including its financial viability and the implications of having potentially incomplete and unused structures at the project site.

2. Phased Construction

The Draft Scope contains discussion of a phased construction approach wherein Phase I includes the adaptive reuse of the Coliseum as a casino space, and Phase II the remainder of the project. The outlined approach lacks clarity regarding whether the applicant will be required to complete the full construction. The EIS must fully analyze an alternative in which only Phase I is completed and should clearly explain which of the promised payments and benefits are contingent upon the development of Phase II.

3. Soils, Topography and Subsurface Conditions

In determining whether a proposed action may have a significant adverse impact on the environment, the lead agency is charged with considering its potential effects on open space and recreational resources of the community. 6 N.Y.C.R.R. § 617.7(c)(1)(viii). As such the Draft Scope must consider potential impacts on the historical Hempstead Plains and the rare species to which it provides habitat. The Hempstead Plains are a region of Long Island that were once an expansive grassland of approximately 40,000 to 60,000 acres. Today, only a 65-acre remnant of the Plains remains. Greater than 99% of the community's area of occupancy has been lost. Several rare species called the Plains home. The importance of conducting comprehensive biological assessments cannot be overstated to ensure the preservation of our natural heritage.

4. Water And Sewer Resources

The Draft Scope significantly underestimates the pressures this development would exert on the Village of Garden City's already strained water supply systems. An exhaustive and independent

hydrological analysis is essential to ascertain the project's true demand and its repercussions on the water resources of neighboring countries, including the Village of Garden City. The Draft Scope should discuss the candidate sites for the proposed new water supply well, and an analysis of capacity concerns and water quality degradation given then impacts related to groundwater withdrawal.

Furthermore, the Draft Scope fails to adequately discuss the capacity of the Cedar Creek Water Pollution Control Plant, particularly in light of the Bay Park Conveyance Project, and the associated water quality impacts from the increased nutrient load.

5. Traffic and Infrastructure Stress

The Draft Scope does not adequately analyze the potential traffic impacts on the Village. The anticipated surge in traffic congestion necessitates a far more detailed investigation to develop solutions that may mitigate the impending strain on the Village's local infrastructure and emergency services. Specifically, the existing documentation fails to assess a study area that is representative of the full scope of the development's reach. The study area must be expanded to sufficiently prove that no significant adverse impacts will occur at the outermost intersections of the Village. Without knowing the full potential for adverse impacts, the traffic cannot adequately identify the mitigation measures that must be included in the Findings statement.

6. Socio-economic and Community Impact

The Draft Scope fails to fully capture the socio-economic detriments of this proposed project. A thorough socio-economic impact study, incorporating detailed analyses of the impacts of casinos on similarly situated communities should be conducted. The scope must establish the requisite metrics and thresholds necessary to quantify the full spectrum of impacts on community character, aesthetic and visual resources, secondary displacement, crime, and addiction.

Given the proximity of this development to educational institutions, there is a pressing need to meticulously evaluate the potential risks this development poses to students. The presence of a casino and associated facilities near colleges and schools raises concerns about the vulnerability of young individuals to gambling and its associated societal issues. A comprehensive study is necessary to fully understand the risks before proceeding with development.

Community character impacts must be assessed beyond the immediate vicinity of the project site. The final scope must consider the development's height, density, and proposed uses, and whether they are consistent with community character. Notably, the consideration of visual impacts from locations as distant as Jones Beach, which is approximately 17 miles away, were analyzed in the Draft Scope, underscoring the expansive reach of the project's impacts.

In light of these observations, we urge a comprehensive re-evaluation of the Draft Scope and FEAF to address these critical oversights. Our commitment to our Village's quality of life obliges us to demand nothing less than a rigorous, transparent, and inclusive planning process.

On behalf of the Incorporated Village of Garden City ("IVGC"), Partridge Venture Engineering, PC dba PVE Engineering ("PVE") has reviewed the Draft Scope for the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) prepared by VHB for Sands New York Integrated Resort project (the "Proposed Project") located at 1255 Hempstead Turnpike and 101 James Doolittle Boulevard in Uniondale, New York (the "Site") and hereby submits the following comments on the Draft Scope:

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE PROPOSED ACTION

<u>Comment 1:</u> Page 3, paragraph 1 states that two different development options are contemplated: The Proposed Project, which includes the integrated resort with casino; and an "alternative development" in the event the Sands does not secure a gaming license. The Draft Scope does not provide any explanation of the development that would occur if the gaming license were not issued or which of the promised payments and benefits would be provided under this alternative. Referenced "alternative development" is not described in the Draft Scope. To understand potential impacts of the alternative development it must be described in as much detail as the proposed action. The DEIS should include an assessment of impacts and mitigation measures for both the proposed and alternative development options. The EIS should also assess its financial viability, and the impacts of a semi constructed, or built but vacant space, must be analyzed.

<u>Comment 2:</u> The FEAF Part 3 attachment notes that the full redevelopment of the Marriott parcel would result in an "increased magnitude of the overall proposed action and associated impacts", but the Draft Scope suggests that no redevelopment of this property will be evaluated. The EIS must consider the entirety of the Proposed Project and must explain exactly what is planned for the Marriott property and how it will be analyzed in the EIS.

Comment 3: Page 4 states that Proposed Project is to be completed in two phases. Phase I will be completed in 2025 and 2026 and will consist of an adaptation of the Coliseum space to casino use, and construction of one of three parking garages and one central utility plant. Phase 2, the full build, will be completed by 2030, and will include additional gaming space, construction of two hotel towers, a conference center, live performance venue, public space, retail space, two parking garages, a central utilities plant, and associated site improvements. The Draft Scope is silent as to whether the applicant will be required to complete the full construction – if it is possible that only Phase 1 would be completed, this must be fully analyzed as an alternative in the EIS. Such analysis should clearly identify the potential payments and benefits that would be provided in the event Phase 2 is never completed and must demonstrate that all impacts associated with Phase 1 construction and operation are fully mitigated without Phase 2.

Page 7 List of Approvals: Town of Hempstead Board of Appeals. Potential Variance(s). The DEIS should specify any variances being contemplated and explain the reasoning for why such variances would be required <u>after</u> the rezoning that is specifically designed to allow for the Proposed Project was approved by the Town of Hempstead.

Comment 5:

Page 9, paragraph 2: Specify the scope of work for supplemental "site-specific test-hole data," including purpose, procedures for collection of soil samples, and methods of soil evaluation. The scope of work for such investigations should be provided and performed in accordance with DER-10 and 6NYCRR Part 375 for the collection and analysis of soil and groundwater samples, including the following analyte lists:

- Part 375 VOCs;
- Part 375 SVOCs;
- Part 375 Metals;
- Part 375 PCBs/Pesticides;
- Per-fluorinated compound list (EPA Method 537).

Comment 6:

Page 9, paragraph 2: Specify how the "suitability of the soils and potential engineering limitations" will be examined, including procedures and methods for such examinations.

Comment 7:

Page 9, paragraph 3: The Draft Scope says that information about surface and subsurface soil quality in the DEIS will be collected from publicly available sources and Environmental Site Assessments. All documentation reviewed should be included in appendices to the DEIS, along with a narrative summary and tables of all sampling and analytical results for the subject property and surrounding lands.

Comment 8:

Page 9, paragraph 4: The Full Environmental Assessment Form (FEAF) lists several petroleum spills. One of those spill records indicates that groundwater was affected by diesel fuel (Spill # 8701759). The spill file was closed by DEC. However, remedial actions, if any, are not described. The DEIS should describe how the potential presence of groundwater contaminated with diesel will be investigated and characterized.

Comment 9:

Page 9, paragraph 4: The DEIS should include an overlay map showing results of previous soil testing in relation to the Proposed Project Site Plan, and must identify locations where impacted materials have been documented at and in the areas surrounding the Site.

Comment 10:

Page 9, paragraph 4: A discussion of impacts and mitigation regarding the potential presence of hazardous materials that could be encountered during excavation and soil disturbance, and the disposal of such materials, should address whether previous environmental investigations and site assessments of former manufacturing and aviation uses included testing for per- and poly-fluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). If the presence of PFAS-contaminated soil and/or groundwater cannot be ruled out based on existing information, the DEIS should include a plan for sampling and analysis of on-site and off-site locations.



Comment 11:

Page 9, paragraph 5: Regarding "management/disposal of impacted surface or subsurface material," the Full EAF Form indicates that 563,000 cubic yards of soil are to be excavated. Non-hazardous solid waste, such as historic fill, among other materials, are subject to state and local regulation. The DEIS should include a plan for management of such materials, including estimated amounts, options for disposal or re-use, and compliance with applicable regulatory requirements.

Comment 12:

Page 9, paragraph 5: A contingency plan must be developed to address discovery of unknown structures or contaminated media encountered during excavation, including identification of additional petroleum spills and reporting procedure to NYSDEC.

Water Resources

Comment 13:

Page 9-10: The FEAF indicates that water usage will be 875,000 gallons per day (gpd), which will be supplied by the Town of Hempstead Water Department from the Uniondale Water District and Mitchell Field Water Supply Area, which tap the Magothy Aquifer. The Proposed Project will necessitate construction of a new 1.98 million gallon per day (mgd) supply well and accompanying water main to meet this need. The information that led to the estimate of 1.98 mgd needs to be incorporated into the scope.

Comment 14:

Page 10, paragraph 1: The DEIS should include an analysis of water demand for the existing development at the Site, and how the proposed development will differ in its water needs. Projections of water use for the Proposed Project should include maximum projections for all possible water demand, including fire flow and irrigation.

Comment 15:

Page 10, paragraph 1: A new water supply well will be required to meet water demand for the Proposed Project. The DEIS should include a detailed discussion of candidate well sites considered and how the location for the new well was selected, along with plans for how the proposed new well will be designed, constructed, and connected to the water distribution system.

Comment 16:

Page 10, paragraph 1: The DEIS should describe the anticipated rate of groundwater withdrawal and how studies will be designed and conducted to establish cumulative drawdown impacts for the expanded water supply area.

Comment 17:

Page 10, paragraph 1: The DEIS should include a study of impacts related to groundwater withdrawal, including the extent to which drawdown effects could influence movement of contaminants from areas of known or suspected groundwater contamination, and potential mitigation measures should such contaminated groundwater impact water supply wells. All such known and suspected locations of contamination should be catalogued and mapped.

Comment 18:

Page 10: Sanitary Wastewater - The FEAF indicates that the proposed action will generate 810,000 gpd of sanitary wastewater. Sanitary wastewater will flow to the Cedar Creek Water Pollution Control Plant, which is within the Roosevelt Industrial Area Sewer District. The developer represents that the existing sewage treatment plant has the capacity to handle the increased load and will not necessitate plant expansion. The DEIS should include calculations of historical sanitary wastewater flows for the new integrated buildout, and a comparison of anticipated flows for the proposed action. Provide calculations and underlying assumptions.



Comment 19:

Page 10, paragraph 2: Conservation measures are expected to reduce sanitary wastewater flows. The DEIS should document and explain proposed water conservation measures and provide calculations for how such measures will reduce sanitary flows.

Comment 20:

Page 10, paragraph 3: The DEIS should provide an analysis demonstrating that the existing capacity of the Cedar Creek plant is sufficient to handle anticipated flows, particularly in light of the Bay Park Conveyance Project, and must analyze the water quality impacts associated with increased nutrient load.

Comment 21:

Page 10, paragraph 3: Provide all communications and correspondence with the Nassau County Department of Public Works relating to assessments of the existing system and its capacity to accept projected flows.

Comment 22:

Page 10, paragraph 3: Describe existing stormwater management systems at the site, and how runoff and infiltration are managed.

Comment 23:

Page 10, paragraph 3 Provide studies and plans quantifying post-development stormwater flows and how regulatory compliance will be achieved for stormwater flows. Explain how the area of impervious surfaced will change and how stormwater flows will be handled by the county sewer system. Identify on-site and off-site stormwater discharge points and infrastructure that will be used for stormwater management.

Comment 24:

Page 10, paragraph 5: Describe impacts to groundwater from post-development stormwater infiltration.

Ecological Resources - Page 11

Comment 25:

The list of approvals required for the Proposed Project references the need for a wetlands permit from NYSDEC for potential traffic mitigation, but the Draft Scope makes no reference to such impacts. Any impacts to wetlands, whether from the Proposed Project or necessary mitigation measures, must be fully analyzed in the DEIS and the applicant must identify how such wetland impacts would be mitigated.

Comment 26:

The FEAF notes that the Proposed Project may have a secondary impact on the Hempstead Plains habitat. The EIS must describe the ecological significance of the Hempstead Plains region, which lies east of the Site. Based on published studies, name and catalogue the species and habitats present, and identify sensitive, threatened, or endangered species that could be impacted.

Comment 27:

Describe potential direct and indirect impacts to ecological resources and habitat in the surrounding area, including the Hempstead Plains region, and measures to mitigate impacts to sensitive, threatened, or endangered species.



Transportation and Parking, Page 12

Comment 28:

Pages 12-13: The transportation analyses must identify every intersection that would experience a significant adverse impact so that mitigation measures can be identified, and all such impacts and necessary mitigation can be considered in the SEQRA Findings. In addition, the EIS must clearly identify all "No Build" projects that were considered in the traffic modeling; no such list is provided in the Draft Scope.

Construction - Page 26-27

Comment 29:

Page 27, paragraph 3: According to the FEAF, of the 563,000 cubic yards of soil to be excavated, it is anticipated that approximately 20% will be re-used on site. The DEIS should clarify whether reprocessing will be required for the material to be re-used, and whether such processing will occur on-site or off-site, and how and where such processing will take place. Truck traffic counts associated with such processing should be accounted for in the traffic studies.

Comment 30:

Page 27, paragraph 3: The 80% of excavated soil to be exported off-site equates to approximately 450,000 cubic yards (yd3). At 30 yd3 per tractor-trailer load this will generate approximately 15,000 round trips during the construction phase of the project. Additionally, development activities will generate an estimated 66,800 tons of C&D waste, which equates to approximately 45,000 cubic yards (assuming a cubic yard of soil weighs 1.5 tons), which will generate approximately 1,500 round trips for disposal. The total number of truck roundtrips generated exclusively for off-site transport of excavated soils and C&D debris will be approximately 16,500. This number could increase by 3,700, to 20,200 roundtrips, if the 20% of material to be re-used on-site is processed off-site prior to re-use. The DEIS traffic analysis must include estimates and impacts for such truck traffic. The DEIS shall also include analysis of truck routes that limit transport through residential areas/sensitive nearby properties, maximization of mapped trucking routes, and promote overall safety.

Comment 31:

Page 27: The DEIS should include detailed plans for the management of excavated surface and subsurface soils that are excavated during site redevelopment. The FEAF Part 1, Section D.2 indicates that building construction, drainage and utility installation, pavement removals, and site preparation will entail excavation of approximately 26.9 acres to depths up to 28 feet, generating approximately 563,000 cubic yards of excavated material over a 2-year period. Clarification is needed regarding the 2-year period for soil excavation. Phase I will be completed in 2025 and 2026, but Phase II will not be completed until 2030. Within this 5- or 6-year period, when will soil excavation occur?

Comment 32:

Page 27, paragraph 1: Specify the types and quantities of excavated material to be re-used on-site, including the types of material to be re-used, and methods and equipment for converting excavated material into usable construction materials.

Comment 33:

Page 27, paragraph 1: Specify types and quantities of excavated material to be transported off site, and the recycling, re-use, or disposal destinations for each type of material. Information about each destination should include the registration or permit requirements and limitations for accepting such material and should include confirmation that the facilities have the capacity for accepting the amounts of material to be exported during the construction phase of the project.



Comment 34:

Page 27, paragraph 1: The FEAF Part 1, Section D.2 indicates that approximately 66,800 tons of solid waste will be generated during construction of the facility. The DEIS should provide the basis for this estimate and identify applicable state and local laws and regulations for management of such construction and demolition (C&D) waste. The FEAF further states that construction waste will be shipped to a licensed facility. The DEIS should identify the types and quantities of C&D material to be transported off site, and the specific recycling, re-use or disposal destinations that will receive each type of material.

Comment 35:

Page 27, paragraph 1: Information about each disposal or recycling destination should include the registration or permit requirements and limitations for accepting such material and confirmation that those facilities have the capacity for accepting the amounts of material to be exported during the construction phase of the project. The DEIS should also explain how exported material will be tracked so that proper disposal can be verified.

Comment 36:

Page 27, paragraph 1: Dewatering during the construction phase could potentially generate large volumes of contaminated groundwater. The DEIS should include detailed plans for management of dewatering discharged, including pre-testing of groundwater to identify contaminants and their concentrations, anticipated volumes of water to be generated, methods of dewatering, plans for containing, testing, treating, and disposing of contaminated water, and the extent to which storage and treatment will occur on-site or off-site.

Comment 37:

Page 27, paragraph 3: Detailed vehicle parking plans for construction workers should be discussed in the DEIS, including plans for off-site satellite parking, if anticipated.

Comment:

Page 27, paragraph 3: Vehicle trips for construction workers, and truck trips for delivery and staging of construction materials and supplies should be factored into the traffic study for both the Phase I and Phase 2 construction periods.

Comment 38:

Page 27, paragraph 3: Traffic impact studies should be designed to cover peak traffic during Phase I and Phase II, which will entail buildout of Phase II while the new casino business is in operation.

EXTENT AND QUALITY OF INFORMATION NEEDED

Comment 39:

Page 30, Soils, Topography and Subsurface Conditions: To the bulleted list, add: Past structure fire locations on and near the project site and the new well locations where PFAS may have been discharged during firefighting.

Comment 40:

Page 30, Water Resources: To the bulleted list, add U.S. Geological Survey National Groundwater Monitoring Network.

CUMULATIVE IMPACTS

Comment 41:

The Scope should expressly list every project (i.e. Hospital Nassau Community College and Roosevelt Field alterations or expansions) that may affect the study area. The Scope should specify that for each analysis category the EIS will include a cumulative impact analysis of those projects, with and without, the Proposed Action and each alternative.
